Sir,

In reply to your letter of the 5th. instant, No. 25583/19, regarding the case of Captain P.T.E. Maxted, late West African Colonial Forces, I am directed to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State, that the medical authorities of this Department assess the degree of disablement at 40% from the 1st August, 1919 to the 31st April, 1920.

If the Officer had served under British Army Regulations he would have been awarded temporary retired pay at the rate of £70 a year from the 1st August, 1919 to the 31st April, 1920 at the expiration of which period his case would again be considered.

A bonus of 50% would be paid on the award from the 1st August, 1919 to the 31st December, 1919.

(2) With reference to my not going to the California on 1st February as offered by Red Cross - Dr. Lepadano and Dr. Rendall were both averse to it - Dr. Rendall I understand wrote his views direct to the Red Cross and I sent them Dr. Lepadano's certificate, a copy of which I enclose marked 'B'. I was not then in a state to stand even a journey of 2 1/2 hours to Cannes. Further I should point out that after my first operation at Kluwan in East Africa I was sent to Nairobi before I was healed - the treatment was changed - tube taken out and six weeks afterwards the

good many senior and junior officers on full pay have been here all the time I have and were paid for by the Red Cross and their wives were also - at the rate of Tr. 30 a day each person. I am, as you know, on half pay - have served in Uganda and East Africa practically the whole of the war - am ill solely on account of that service my health probably ruined and am not granted this privilege either for myself or my sister who came out to look after me. I am afraid I don't understand why especially as Uganda and East Africa understood so generously to the Red Cross and have made so few calls on it. I believe I am almost the only officer from East Africa or Uganda sent to the Riviera during the war. I only know of one other but hope there are more.

anyway had returned and a second operation was performed at Mombasa. A month later - again with an unhealed wound - I was sent to Dar-es-Salaam for ten days and the wound was neglected tube removed etc. : result that when I joined the hospital ship "Gascorn" there for the Cape it was thought a third operation would be necessary - but it was averted by rather drastic treatment and a stay of six weeks at Wyndberg hospital. When however I arrived here in December a third operation was found to be essential and it was the most severe of them all. My aversion to trying a change of treatment again when half cured will be understood. I have no wish to undergo a fourth operation, even if I had been in a fit state to undertake the journey, also in face of the doctor's opinions I was practically powerless to do so. The Red Cross did not give me the option of going to the California when I was well enough - I was to go on 1st February and from that date they had finished with me as far as Mombasa was concerned. I moved here from the Clinique because it was cheaper and also because it is up the hill and Dr. Lepiano recommended it as better for my lung. A good
