Sir,

With further reference to our letter to you of the 17th January, in which we stated that it had been brought to our notice that the Government of Australia was contemplating a monopoly in connection with the manufacture of soda and soda products throughout Australia and placing such monopoly in the hands of Messrs. Brunner Mond & Company, Limited, we are glad to hear that you are of the opinion as follows:-

... a copy of a cutting of the *Advertiser*, which was sent to us by your agent, Messrs. Dalgely & Company, Ltd., of Sydney, under date of the 10th January, 1919, from which it appears that a Committee of the Council of the Commonwealth Government interested in the Alkali industry in Australia invited a representative of Messrs. Brunner Mond & Company, Ltd., to survey the resources of the Commonwealth in connection with the production of soda ash.

In the second place Messrs. Dalgely & Company Ltd. write that the matter will be of interest to us as Messrs. Brunner Mond & Company would undoubtedly press for a fairly heavy duty on soda ash manufacture should they be successful in establishing the works in Victoria.

My partners desire respectfully to submit to you, and would be very glad you to submit to the Administration concerned that, in view of their intentions in the near future to export Soda, Soda Ash and Soda products to Australia in quan-

titles that will, eventually, be only limited by the demand and freight facilities, it would be to the disadvantage on the one hand of the Protectorate, which receives an export duty of 2/- per ton, and, on the other hand, <sup>of</sup> Australian consumers, should preferential tariffs prevent the free import on a competitive basis of the material they require.

It seems likely that the Australian Administration must, on the one hand, be unaware that it would be necessary to import raw material for manufacture into Soda (Alkali) and Soda products, and, on the other hand, that there are vast quantities of Natural Soda so much closer at hand in the East Africa Protectorate.

As you are aware, the Magadi Soda Deposit is apparently inexhaustible, and has a practical working surface of 44 square miles and is of unknown depth. Should the Administration concerned desire to have full information as to the practical potentialities of the above Deposit my Directors will be only too glad to place all information at their disposal.

**"A NEW INDUSTRY"**

"Investigations are now being made into the prospects of the Alkali industry in Australia. Early this year large consumers of Alkali, urged thereto by the shortage of these commodities, formed a committee with chemical and metallurgical manufacturers for the purpose of securing the establishment of the industry in Australia. Such an industry it was recognized would be a key industry, just as the manufacture of iron and the making of sulphuric acid are key industries. At the invitation of the committee, a representative of Brunner Mond & Company, Ltd., was despatched here, and a survey of the resources of the Commonwealth was undertaken. The natural resources to serve as a commercial basis for the industry are peculiar, and, according to a correspondent of the "Age", the survey reveals that Australia is comparatively poorly endowed in this regard. The national importance of the matter, however, is compelling attention to the utilization of such resources as we possess to satisfy the essential conditions for the establishment of the alkali industry. At the present stage, however, nothing definite has been decided upon, and investigations in two States are still in progress, and in two other States have barely been completed. A decision will not be reached until the reports from all the States have been considered and presented to the committee's advisers in England."
