We think, however, it is only right to point out that under the present conditions ruling we have a steamer leaving for East Africa only very occasionally, but if it is your wish that all passengers booked should be referred to you in order to obtain a priority recommendation, we shall be agreeable to fall in with your wishes.

As, however, these steamers are running at such long intervals, we propose to reserve the right of booking two of our employees in each ship as it leaves this country.

I am in receipt of the enclosed
of your letter of 20 Feb 2003
regarding the provision of
information for East Africa on
the basis of the P.D.L. last
time.

The Board will appreciate
that only those persons who are
applying to our two Rivers that
they have a reasonable
expectation of being classed

in one of the categories required
by this Dept should be opened to the
Govt to explain that had there
been no decree he would not have
had the amount of money in the
allocation of books on other terms,
which is entirely a matter for the
Govt but that it would be un-
fair if great sums could
be given to those cases in which
a recommendation for an extra
parash is furnished by the Dept.

How much can you tell me in
relation to the proposal in the
last part of your letter

in one of the categories required
by the West should be given to him.
I am to explain that I have
had no desire to interfere with
the Committee on Finance in the
allocation of funds on other items,
which is entirely a matter for the
Committee, but that it would be
best if special comm could
