I give herewith particulars -


My husband is a Londoner, born at 31 Maddox St. W. in Oct 15
1859 and he lived there for 36 years. He served 22 years
in the St Georges' Volunteers and gained the long service
medal. He was sent out to Nairobi by a London firm of
merchants in 1912 and has, as far as I know, now ceased to
receive any salary, owing to his enlistment. His salary this
year was £114 a month & he was employed by J Dobbel of
Nairobi. As requested by the local committee, I enclose

my marriage certificate,
together with my husband's
last letter giving his regimental
number. I also enclose my
husband's former business
card.

I trust the above
will enable you to assist me
during my husband's absence
from business on active service
but should you require any

them.


