

Dear Sir,

I am desired by the East African Section of this Chamber to say that at a recent meeting they had under consideration the British East African Electric Power Ordinance the draft of which had just reached this country.

A discussion took place and a Sub-Committee was appointed to examine the Bill and draw up a statement on the points which appeared to the Section to be open to objection and I am instructed by the Chairman of the Section to say that it is considered that in its present form the operation of the ordinance is likely to affect adversely the commercial interests of the Protectorate.

It is recognised that the Government should have adequate control over the water rights throughout the Colony but apart from this it is considered that the Colony is not sufficiently advanced in development to warrant such comprehensive restrictions.

The Ordinance appears to go further in the direction of Government intervention in the Electricity Supply business than so far as is known is the case in any other Country.

It is considered that a large number of the Clauses should be omitted from the Ordinance until such time as the development of the Colony has reached a much more advanced stage.

Otherwise it is feared that the necessity of conforming with the provisions of this Ordinance must result in hampering the utilisation of electric power in the Colony.

In these circumstances I am instructed to say that the East African Section of the London Chamber of Commerce respectively recommend that:-

1. The Ordinance in whatever form it may be passed into Law shall only apply to public supply installations.
2. That any installation already in existence or contracted for before the passing of the Ordinance into Law shall not be compelled to conform to the clauses which call for any alteration in existing plant or services without adequate compensation.
3. That the draft of the Ordinance be submitted for revision to a joint conference of the Colonial Office and representatives of the local and commercial interests affected..
