COAL FOR EAST AFRICAN RAILWAYS 1920 SUPPLY

We beg to confirm the informal conversation of the signers
with Mr. Bottomley on 12th. inst. re above.

The position is that the Natal Coalowners Association is now meeting to fix the basis of prices for 1920 supplies. An advance by them of at least 3s/6d. per ton F.O.B. Durban, over their 1919 prices, is absolutely certain, and it may be more. Durban prices F.O.B. are, as you know, exclusive of trimming in the ship's hold, which for some years had ruled at 1/- shg. per ton, payable by the buyers. Since early this year the Durban trimming cost has risen to about 1s/6d. per ton of 2240 lbs. and there seems small hope of reduction, for it depends on labour rates, which are upward.

A further change in the position re export coal supplies at Durban is that owing to the great demand (chiefly for ships bunkering there to economise against home coals) and to the consequent need for quick despatch of steamers, the South African Government authorities require that a ship taking export coal or bunker coal must accept whatever coals be in truck at the port, regardless of the colliery or group of collieries by which produced. There are about seventeen such groups of collieries in Natal, and the products differ from each other considerably in user's estimation, but in Natal contracts it is no longer possi-

ble to obtain a specification as to which coal shall be supplied. This is specially disadvantageous re coal for Railway purposes, where regularity is so necessary.

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The above general information may be interesting to the East African Railway authorities, and it is very fortunate that they have throughout specified Transvaal Witbank Coal, for the above difficulties do not exist in the case of Transvaal coals and any colliery or group of collieries may be specified in contracts F.O.B. Delagoa Bay.

The Transvaal Coalowners' Association is waiting until after the Natal Coalowners' meetings before fixing the Transvaal basis of prices for 1920, but in your interests they have been good enough to give us an option for you over Witbank Coals to your standard specification for 1920, F.O.B. Delagoa Bay - the quantity to be taken between January 1st and December 31st, 1920

(a) minimum, 25,000 tons.

(b) maximum, 50,000 tons.

and we are authorised to offer the above to you at price per 2240 lbs. 28s/9d. (Twenty-eight shillings and ninepence) inclusive of trimming in ship's hold to be paid by the suppliers.

The above price is to be (as previously) subject to increase or decrease by the amount of any alterations in the South African Government Railway and Harbour rates and charges. The above price is based on the rates and charges ruling to-day, i.e. it has taken into account the 13 pence rail rate reduction recently granted.

Mr. Bottomley will be pleased to note that the price of 28s/9d. is precisely 13 pence lower than the figure forecasted to him by the signer a week ago. This is the result of further cables to and from South Africa.

The offer includes the usual condition that in contracting for the minimum tonnage (25,000) any requirements by the East African Railways in excess of that minimum, up to the maximum to be reserved for you (50,000) will be ordered on the

contract.

It is desired to offer and to recommend the suggestion that the railway coal requirements of the Mandated Territory and Zanzibar Railways be taken ex your contracts for East African Railway coal, and not on separate contracts. This will make for simplicity and economy in working, and ease the despatch of ships, with advantage to the Governments concerned.

It is hoped that you may be able to state by December 10th, whether above offer is accepted. It would be very
