As regards 2 she does not say when the
marriage took place & she has lost
her marriage license. This loss, however,
is immaterial if she is doubt is the
case & she can get a certified copy
of the entry recording her marriage
from the Registrar of the concerned.

She may also perhaps be required to
supply some evidence of her identity
with the woman referred to in such
certificate which it is no doubt to
be supplied by persons acquainted
with her. Her husband herself.

able to do so. I do not know
whether the authorities working
under the Aliens Restriction Act demand
complete proof of
nationality in all cases.

he tells me that if she can produce
the certificate re her husband's
death & her marriage, they will
not worry as to any possible change
of his husband's nationality before
his death unless there was
something to create suspicion
about him - which I do not
think there is in this case.
