Dear Sir.

My husband Joseph Djerman has been in Mombasa British East Africa since June last as manager for the East African Industries Ltd. He was engaged to take out his wife and family as we are

his legs below the knee.  
He was very ill for three  
months but got quite  
well ~~but~~ left ~~then~~ he could  
not walk. He has been  
gradually improving ever  
since, and in October I  
sent him to the Children's  
Hospital (Newcastle). He has  
been treated, and has improved  
so much, that he has been  
fitted with boots & supports  
and is now learning to walk.  
The Doctor and nurses at  
the hospital tell me he will  
not require the supports long  
but will soon be alright.  
He is strong and healthy  
in every other way. A boy  
for his age, and is very  
intelligent. His legs are not  
deformed only weak.  
I cannot bear to leave my  
boy behind, and would like  
to know if I can get Special  
permission to pass the Immigration  
Officers at Mombasa.  
I should be much obliged  
if you will let me know what  
you can do in the matter, as  
I sail a month today.
