Gen. Northy arrived in this country on 18<sup>th</sup> Aug 1918. He came on full pay from E.A.P. on 18<sup>th</sup> Aug left on December 18<sup>th</sup>. We understand from Messrs Cox & Co. that as from the 18th August 1918 such pay has been issued through your office.

We understood from General Northey before he left England that his pay, being in respect of his office as the Governor of British East Africa, was not liable to tax, and if this is so neither would it be liable to Super Tax. Will you kindly inform us on this subject.

- (2) Since the 18<sup>th</sup> Aug. last his brother was  
paid salary at the rate of £100 per

that date being parallel only while  
the post is actually in the Post  
Office.
- (3) As Dr. F. H. Horne's remuneration  
is paid wholly from the £100 & Bangalore Post  
Funds, he is not liable to income  
tax in respect of it when he is abroad  
in this country. The fact that  
he is liable for tax in respect of his  
private residence here, 19th Aug. to  
7th Dec. 1911, is not true on which the  
letter which you have just received
