I have to acknowledge receipt of your memo No. 3181/1919 of 2nd inst.

I note that Viscount Milner is unable to alter his decisions already conveyed to me, but there is nothing in your above quoted memo to indicate whether any steps will be taken to bring the Regulations governing officers of the East Africa Local Forces into line with those governing other officers, when East African officers are in receipt of Imperial rates of pay only.

I beg respectfully to ask for information on this point, as it is my intention to press, by whatever legal means I may, for the adjustment of what I consider to be an obvious injustice.

If I am in order in so doing, I wish to ask whether in the opinion of The Rt. Honble. The Secretary of State for the Colonies, my case as submitted does not show injustice in treatment as between an Imperial Officer and one belonging to the East Africa Local Forces. If he considers there is such injustice, might I be informed whether steps will be taken to rectify the Regulations concerned.

Paragraph 2 of your memo is noted. I would like to point out however that it reads as though I had already relinquished my commission, which, so far as I am aware, is not the case.
