Dear Sir,

We have to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 12th instant, and beg to inform you that the late Mr. Percival Bright Williams was engaged by us in East Africa as a Contractor of transport work.

From the year commencing August 1913 and ending August 1914 Mr. Bright Williams received from us an average payment of about Rs. 4500 = 2300.

We are unable, of course, to say what proportion of this would be payable to Mr. Bright Williams as he had to pay for his own transport animals and carts and pay for his own expenses.

We trust that the above will be what you require.

Dear Mr. Brock,

I am afraid I did not make myself clear the other day in our telephone conversation, regarding when I asked if you could let me have a copy of the forms which you require completed before considering an appl<sup>n</sup> for an alternative pension.

You suggested that the application should be made in the usual way through a local Pension Committee. This would no doubt be satisfactory if the man has gained his livelihood in this county before the war. The Pension Committee would appear to be the best place where the man could make his case. It is a pity that the Pension Committee is a large number of the cases which are referred to the C.A.P. for

The present procedure is that we send the <sup>accepted</sup> letter of appl<sup>n</sup> to you; you return us two forms, one by the applicant and one by the employer. When we have the forms completed we return them to you for action with the applicant (eligible for an alternative pension) and the address covered under a Bullock Clerk Page.
