

SIR,

I have the honour to submit for your consideration and favour of necessary action the attached correspondence and marked A to E.

(a). In view of the ruling given by the War Office in Circular V and marked B I cannot agree with the reply given by the Director of Military Labour, vide annexure D (a) ("That the concession of a passage to England was ultimately defined as limited to Officers commissioned in East Africa.") My contention is that the War Office allowed to Officers of East African Units a free passage home and not ~~that~~ the D.M.L. interprets the concession for East African ~~units~~ Commissioned Officers only. All commissioned Officers were members of one the one Corps and all performed similar work and yet some are granted a concession and others not. If the argument advanced is that East Africans are living in an unhealthy country and for their ^{best} children's sake given a passage to England so Rhodesians living in quite as unhealthy a country.

(b). I am claiming this amount from the Crown Agents for the Colonies London

(c). When I was serving in Tabora the D.M.L. communicated with me to the effect that Officers and N.C.O's who were re-engaging for a further period of service were dealt so under Army Order 84 of 1918. Why he now states that Army Order 84 of 1918 does not apply to A.E.A. units, I cannot conceive. Further he does not repudiate the terms of Army Form 2.70 which were issued by the Army Council and which are applicable to my own case. If you refer to Paragraph 5 of my letter of 18th July you will see that I mentioned I had no agreement with the D.M.L. as to my period of service and as I was retained by the Corps after 1st February on Demobilisation ~~that~~ ^{that} additional pay is claimed. Other Officers had an agreement to serve until 28th May but I had not. In January of this year I

informed the D.M.L. that I wished to obtain my release but he
informed me ^{through} that the Senior Paymaster my application has been
noted and I would be released as soon as I could be spared.
This is I think sufficient proof that my services were required
for a further period of service ^{after the 1st February} at the D.M.L. instigation.

(B). My remarks in (C) refer also to (D) as Army Order
54/1918 lays down the conditions of leave. . The draft Force
order was shown to me by the Staff Officer M.L.G. Durban who
allowed me to take a copy.

Trusting you will give this your attention and
favour me a reply.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit for consideration the unmentioned claims in respect of (a) Refund of 1st Class passage paid from South Africa to England, (b) War Bonus pay of £3 per mensem (c) Demobilisation leave pay.

(a) In this instance I have to inform you that, in reply to one of the Senior Prymasars, Dar-es-Salaam enquires as to the destination of demobilisation of myself in (about) March last, I advised him I wished for a passage to England. About the same time the Director of Military Labour, Dar-es-Salaam issued the following, which is an extract from Circular 7 of 20.5.18 "The War Office have now approved of the following:-
(a) All Officers and other ranks who have served in the E. of Africa Unit for a period of 12 months will be given a free passage to England or South Africa."

I embarked at Dar-es-Salaam on the 20.6.18 on the S.M.A.S. "Gascon" for England but was informed on the voyage I was only booked for Durban. On my arrival here you received the following wire in reply to your W.L.530 - begins "S.S.230 L.S. - 530 AAA Lieut. JACKSON not entitled passage AAA only though no re-engaged 1 year obligation" I maintain that under Circular 7 which was issued before my departure or re-engaging was made, I am entitled to a free passage from England. I cannot understand why there is a refusal to give me a free passage and therefore make a claim for the same. I would claim that I have paid the Union Castle Co. for my passage to England.

(b). I also beg to claim the War Bonus which has been sanctioned by the Colonial Office as will be seen from the

following report taken from the "Daily Star" - July 31st. It has been decided that Officers of 1st East African and Mesopotamian Forces, shall receive War Bonus at same rates and on same conditions as approved for E.A.R. Officers. This effect from 1st October 1917 - "I therefore claim for being in months service from 6th January 1918 - 15th July 1918 at 48 per month the same as to single Officers.

(c). Under Army Order 54 1918 "Army of Occupation allowance" I submit a claim for the amount of £20.18, being pay at £1.8. per month from 1.2.19 - 15.7.19 I never made any agreement with the M.L.G. as to the conditions of my service with this Corps, and as I was retained after the 1st December 1918 on Demobilisation work, under Army Form 270 which states "Section 4 B (e) that if any man who is eligible for release is necessarily retained to carry out the demobilization of others he shall receive the same pay as those retained. I claim this sum.

(d) Further under Army Order 12 1918 and Force Order 1170 I copy of which are attached a claim for 5 days leave in 1918. I was in the service in every month of service from 1st January 1918 to 15th July 1918 I therefore request that my service be post-dated to October 1918 and that I receive 5 days leave per month at a rate of £70.0.0. I enclose a copy of the report of the M.L.G. and the Force Order.

I am sure that you will acknowledge this claim and will be taking all necessary steps to avoid some difficulties in the event of an unfavourable reply.

- (b). All Officers who have served in an East African Unit for a period of twenty months will be granted a free passage to England and back to East Africa.
- (c). All other ranks who have served in an East African Unit for a period of twenty four months will be granted a free passage to England and back to East Africa.
- All Officers and other ranks who wish to avail themselves of the above will put in an application without delay to this Office stating whether they require a single or return passage.

Your letter of July 1918 addressed to an Staff Officer
L.S. Dutton, has been forwarded to me for disposal. The reply to
your questions are as follows :-

(a) The reason quoted by you as given in M.L. 520 for refus-
ing your passage home is not correct. The concession of a
passage to England was ultimately defined as limited to
Officers Commissioned in East Africa. You were commissioned
in Rhodesia, and are therefore not entitled to a passage.

(b) You are entitled to the new terms.

(c) Army Order 51 of 1918 does not apply to the M.L.C.
(vide para 3) because its application has not been
authorized by the Army Council.

(d) I fail to see how Army Order can be quoted
as evidence of anything except that you have illegally
retained a copy of a confidential document to which you
got access. In any case, however, it only quotes terms
on which you may be allowed to re-engage for further
service. I have evidence that you were re-engaged
on those terms before proceeding further with the War.
There is no record in this Office, and that I am that
your discharge was not completed on April 1st, 1918,
evidence that you were re-engaged for post-war work on
the new terms.

Draft Force Order

Comments - East African Protectorate Forces.

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Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and men of the East African Protectorate Force (other than the King's African Rifles) are allowed to re-engage for a further period of service under the following conditions:-

PERIOD OF SERVICE. - One year, or less, as from 1st April, 1919.

PAID. Those re-engaging will receive their present rate of pay, plus the full Army of Occupation Bonus, under Army Order No. 54. of 1919 with effect from 1st April, 1919.

LEAVE. On termination of this further period of service leave will be granted to all ranks on full pay at the rate of five days per month for each month's resident service, provided such service exceeds twelve months; and at the rate of three days per month, if they fall short of twelve months' service.

PASSAGES. If desired, after release, free passage will be granted to Officers and other ranks under the following conditions:-

OFFICERS. After twenty months resident Military service to the United Kingdom or country of origin, and return to East Africa within six months of arrival in the United Kingdom or country of origin.

OTHER RANKS. As for Officers, but after twenty four months resident Military Service.

ALL RANKS. After twenty months resident Military Service, a single passage to the United Kingdom or country of origin.

The bonus referred to in para 1 (ii) above, and ration allowance payable during the period of leave authorized in para 1 (iii) will not be taken into account in the assessment of any Gratuity.

Application for re-engagement will be submitted for approval as under:-

East African Pay Corps. To the Chief Paymaster, East African Pay Corps, NAIROBI.

Other. To, the General Officer commanding East African General Headquarters, NAIROBI.
