I am making out a
statement in tabular form
showing how all our own
possessions in Africa stand
as regards laws dealing

with ivory & rhinoceros,
& I will send you one in a
day or two.

It is possible if our own
possessions in Africa the
laws in force in the Sudan
present the most difficulty.
Who will have authority at
the conference to say that the
Sudan will or will not
adopt the proposed scheme,
particularly in regard to
Trade in ivory & rhino-
ceros which it is desired

to prohibit entry from you
or exit under a license?

Probably it will be found that
after the proposals have been discussed
at the conference & a definite code
of laws drafted, these laws will
have to be sent to all the local
administrators in Africa for
their approval or criticism.

Is it possible that Liberia has
been forgotten in the invitation
for delegates. It is rather an
important position & they would
probably be incensed if forgotten
& might give endless trouble by
keeping open ports. I only put forward
the suggestion with diffidence & I
expect the Foreign Office have done
all that is necessary but I think
it would be wise to make sure
of this point before it is too late.
