From 1909, it appears that he was temporarily appointed Asst. Game Warden in C.A.P. in Nov. 1909. pending the decision as to a suitable candidate for the post of Game Warden. Mr. P. ... was appointed Game Warden and Mr. ...'s engagement was not renewed on its expiration on 4 July 1911 (see 15558/11)

He afterwards obtained temporary employment as a Return Inspecting Officer (superannuated in January, 1912 (see 2707/12). The appointment only lasted until 31 March 1912. (see 3745/12)

We cannot say ^{definitely} what his prospects of employment will be after the war: but in view of his age, I should say that there is not much hope.

We have no record of "continuous" temporary employment, as, apart from the absence of any record of employment since March 1912, there was a break in 1911.
