I have the homour to report that in July last I received a communication from the Land Officer informing me that the area of Farm No. 71 Noara River, originally granted to Mr. R. A. H. Rawkes, and now held by Mr. H. Wood, which was formerly snown as comprising an area of 640 acres, has been found on re-survey to be of 602.06 acres only. The Land Officer requested permission to make up this shortage either by granting Mr. Wood the balance of 37,94 seres elsewhere or by offering him monetary compensation.

In the case of Mr. W. damage was the market price of the land at the time of the breach. The Attorney General considered that both these contentions were substantially varid, and was of opinion that if Mr. Wood were also to seek remedy in the Courts he would in all probability succeed, as the shortage amounted to nearly 6% of the area which it was agreed to sell. He therefore advised that the Land Officer should make the best bargain he could with Mr. Wood.

- 3. I ordered action to be taken accordingly and in due course the Land Officer reported that Mr. Wood was not prepared to accept less than £4 per acre.

 As a few months after purchasing the farm he sold a portion of it at £5 per acre this was considered a reasonable price and I agreed to the payment of £52 is full settlement of his claims. This sum, together with that awarded to Mr. Hall, will be met
