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FROM GENERAL AITKEN,

9th November 1914.

S.27 ..... reference telegram No. 1882

from London received 7th November. Have consulted  
(authorities)

Stewart also local and naval and have made following  
dispositions for the defence of Protectorate.

British Infantry 28th Mountain Battery to Nairobi;

1/2 Battalion Kashmir Rifles and Faridkot Sappers to

Voi.....

one battalion Kashmir Rifles to Gazi.....13th Rajputs

to Uganda to replace Uganda troops employed in

Protectorate. 25th and 26th Ry. Cos. to guard whole

railway. Armoured train to section Nairobi-Lake.

101st remains here also 61st 93rd and 98th. Rampur  
and Gwalior Contingent details to Zanzibar at urgent  
request of Resident; both unreliable but intact.

Political reasons (make it?) (desirable) to keep them  
on service and they are quite safe there. 61st, 63rd  
and 98th useless and two former particularly so.

Strongly

Strongly recommend early return to India and their  
being replaced by two thoroughly reliable units.  
  
Am landing other details and stores here. Above  
will insure safe defence of Protectorate. Shall  
require 10 maxims and good supplies of equipment and  
kit to complete above units selected to remain. As  
regards offensive action will require at least two  
full Brigades . . . . of . . . . thoroughly reliable troops  
in addition to troops required (for) communications  
outposts etc. If this can be supplied might advantage

Tanga difficult and can easily be made very much more so; entrance channel not difficult to obstruct, country very thick ~~town~~ very concealed and all defences..
