RAILWAY ARTIZANS
SCALE OF SALARY

For reasons given strongly recommends existing system should be adhered to and men should be obtained from England on Rs 200-250 even though scale remains at Rs 160-250 per month.

Dr Bottomley, Mr. Read

It seems a queer idea and some points require explanation, but there is something to be said. For not making 2 grades of locally engaged men - minimum Rs 160 & men engaged in England, minimum Rs 200. They want first class artisans from England to leave the ~~it~~ engaged men, and ~~want~~ to put all the men from home in a separate grade.

I do not understand the point about locally engaged men going to England from time to time to improve their knowledge. The Govt. implies that men who do so will be given the minimum Rs 200 when they return but he does not definitely say so. As requirements are not "fixed" in the

case of these men, there would presumably be no objection to raising a man ~~now~~^{at once} from Rs 160 to 200 if he put in a visit to England during his leave.

On the other hand we have just learnt that the Railway authorities are now ^{only final} ~~and~~ ^{are} ~~wanting~~ ^{to give} engaged men a passage to England when they are granted leave, and only do so in special cases.

I think on the whole we should allow the system to continue : The Railway ~~authorities~~ ^{are} ~~and~~ ^{ought} managed in a different way. Has the deptt of the Protectorate railway employes cannot it seems be forced to regard themselves as public servants and must have other incentives to work than exist in the public service.

I acthur recd and approve of the continuance of the system on the understanding that only men engaged in England are offered the commencing salary of Rs 200, and ask Govt whether the S.D.P. is to understand that a locally engaged man may expect to have his salary raised to Rs 200 if he spends his leave in England ^{without previous} ^{or} ^{any} ^{knowledge} ^{of} ^{the} ^{act}, and also whether locally engaged are given a free passage to England on application when they are discharged.

We took some pains last year to ascertain
 that all the European racing associations

I have the honour to refer to paragraph 2 of your despatch No. 998 of the 11th of November last on the subject of the scale of salaries for artizans on the Uganda Railway.

2. The scale for first-class artizans i.e. Rs.160-250 was fixed at this minimum and maximum to cover both locally engaged men as well as those appointed in England under agreement.

3. I desire to observe that the latter class of artizan cannot be obtained for the same rate as a European trained in an Indian or Colonial business. The aim of the Railway in obtaining labour trained in England is that the men so employed shall raise the general level of efficiency and teach the locally trained artizan the latest English practices. It is therefore both essential and beneficial to offer them a commencing salary higher than that which is given to locally engaged men, although for obvious
