The blood slides sent me yesterday from a prisoner shew no malarix nor does the blood even shew any of the subsidiary signs which would suggest that he has had Halaria. I searched through the slides carefully but could find no malarial perasites.

There is no marked increase in the percentage of large monomublears; there was no pigment in any of them; and there was no polychromasis of the red cells, some or all of which subsidiary signs one expects to find in the blood of persons who have had malaris even although no actual parasites may be found.

Although it is impossible to prove an absolute negative, in my opinion is is extremely improbable that this individual has had malais, and more particularly malaris of wich severity as to osuse delirium.
