Sir,

I have the honour to forward copies of correspondence relating to the loss of 18 packages of foodstuffs part of a consignment despatched by the Mombasa Local Committee of Supplies to the Kisimayu Local Committee of Supplies on August 11th.

2. It would appear that the goods actually despatched were not entered on the ship's manifest as the ship S.S. "Duplex" was at the time of govt. Charter and no receipt was issued on the behalf of Purex or Duplex. It is not apparent if a receipt was given to the Captain of the Duplex at Kisimayu by the Officer who received the goods.
3. Further the loss was not reported until November 24th. though the goods were despatched on August 10th. There are certain discrepancies in the various letters which will best be shewn in a comparative table :-

Sir,

I have the honour to forward copies of correspondence relating to the loss of 18 packages of foodstuffs part of a consignment despatched by the Mombasa Local Committee of Supplies to the Kisimayu Local Committee of Supplies on August 10th.

2. It would appear that the goods actually despatched were not entered on the ship's manifest as the ship S.S. "Duplex" was at the time of port charter and no receipt was given to the Captain or Purser of Duplex. It is not apparent if a receipt was given to the Captain of the Duplex at Kisimayu by the Officer who received the goods.
3. Further the loss was not reported until November 24th. though the goods were despatched on August 10th. There are certain discrepancies in the various letters which will best be shown in a comparative table :-

4. Re Beans.

No beans were advised as despatched but 10 bags were billed and 9 received.

5. Re Maize.

209 bags were despatched, none were billed and 206 were received.

In enclosure 8 Mr. Gregory says 209 bags of maize were returned from Kismayu and that therefore no bill was sent. He can give no information as to the 806 bags acknowledged by the Provincial Commissioner in enclosure 3.

6. Re Salt.

This appears from enclosure 1 to be part of the ship's stores and to have been delivered in error at Kismayu.

7. Articles missing.

If the maize is reckoned there are 21 packages missing and otherwise 18 packages.

I am to request that the less be dealt with by you and to add that the two members of the Central Committee.

Committee of Supplies mentioned in the letter (No. 9),
from the President Local Committee of Supplies, Mombasa
did not understand that the matter was being discussed
formally at Mombasa.

I have the honour to report a discrepancy in the food supplies received here in August last and your invoice showing the supplies despatched by you.

3. The statement you sent is updated, I enclose a copy of it.

5. The supplies which actually arrived here and passed through the customs were :-

1 bag beans
1 bag sugar
12 bags flour
18 bags coffee
10 c/s Tea
54 c/s Milk
8 c/s Matches
124 bags Rice
1 bag salt
206 bags maize
110 bags Potatoes

6 cases Ideal milk

Sir,

In reply to your letter No. 278/23 dated 21st No. 14 I have the honour to place before you the results of my enquiry :-

- (a) The stores were sent by the Offr. Comdg. Troops Mombasa to the Offr. Comdg. Troops Kismayu via the S.S. "Duplex" early in August.
- (b) Mr. Dundas District Commissioner, took charge of it on behalf of the staff Officer, Jubaland.
- (c) On the return of the Provincial Commissioner, from safari Mr. Dundas resigned from the charge of the Government Food Depot which had previously been formed.
- (d) The acting Prov. Commr. ordered Mr. Pagden A.D.C. to check and take over charge of the stores mentioned above but the District Commissioner objected on the grounds that he was personally responsible to the staff officer. As a result the Prov. Commr. instructed Mr. Pagden not to take over these stores but to take charge of the Food Depot only.
- (e) On the 18th September 1914 I received through the Prov. Commr. a request from the Dir. of Supplies for acknowledgement and payment of short mly stores on checking them I found the following shortages for which I cannot account:-

1 bag beans

1 bag flour

1 bag sugar

1 bag coffee

6 cases Ideal milk

6 bags rice

2 bags potatoe

(f) As a result the acting Commissioner declined to sign the vouchers and called upon Mr. Dundas for an explanation. Up to the present he has seen no explanation from Mr. Dundas other than a short note refusing responsibility.

From Mr. Egerton who was in charge of transport for Mr. Gregory I learnt that the goods sent to Kisimayu early in August were issued direct to the "Duplex" from the Customs. Further Mr. Egerton had nothing to do with this shipment. The original order appears to have been a verbal one only.

The customs clerk who issued the supplies was informed on the matter that as the ship was chartered by Government no receipt was necessary consequently there is no document to show that the goods were actually shipped.

I was informed that 208 bags of maize had been sent to Kisimayu and that the "Duplex" brought these back again. Yet Kisimayu people acknowledge having received 206 bags.

Perhaps Mr. Gregory may be able to keep in the addition of this latter.

Referring to the attached I have the honour to inform you that the stores as stated on Invoice dated August 11th were shipped on Board the Duplex by the Customs and I attach a copy of the certificate.

2. The pilfering must either have occurred on the voyage or at Kiambu.
3. Two bags Marine Stores despatched also, but as they were returned the cost was not debited to the ship. The bags were taken on charge against passengers.

Shortage in Shipment to Kisimayu

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that out of a consignment of 347 packages shipped to Kisimayu by the Local Committee of Supplies on the 11th August last per S.S. "Duplex" 18 packages as detailed in District Commissioner of Kisimayu's letter of the 30th Nov. are missing.

The S.S. "Duplex" was at that time on Government charter and the goods were not entered on the ship's Manifest as would have been done if shipped by an ordinary Merchant vessel, it is therefore quite impossible to trace where the loss took place.

The matter was placed before the Local Committee which included two representatives from the Central Committee, and it was unanimously agreed that the Central Committee should be asked to sanction the loss being written off, or if the Central Committee does not possess the necessary power that it be asked to place the matter before the Hon. the Chief Secretary with a recommendation that the loss be written off.
