On details I attach the following which we constructed together. Please note my addition in Head 35 Currency Dept. We struck out all the figures that could be struck out, and in many cases probably have been given. We did not however go into the Railway staff details & I attach a separate Table extracted.

On the general position:- The state of the Prot's finances due to the war have been dealt with at length on other papers & need not be gone into here, though I find it difficult to understand the figures given of the defence liability up to 31st March 1915 of £1,450,000. (Budget Statement) & the staff have a balance of about £1,150,000. The other

figures show a balance of £1,500,000. It is not clear what the £500,000 difference is.

The Government has cut down a great deal, and it is no small matter to knock nearly 14% off the budget. The estimate of revenue is however a very conservative one and we have proposed to reduce it by £11,375. The two reductions in expenditure caused by the memorandum amount only to £11,125 leaving £1,275 to be covered by another, i.e. saving. This can be done, I think, on the Railway Staff additional hardship. Please see how 18 of the following cases  
(a). I think it would be difficult to add another and Traffic Manager, especially having had a light. We should only be able to do this. In any case an extra will not be filled up for staff purposes.  
(b). I don't if this is sufficient reason for reducing the Estimate of £1466 required for the European outlay of the additional stores. It is extremely unlikely that the "Syrup" can be replaced during the year. Here again however the extra will not be filled. As even if the provision is allowed to remain.

In reference to my despatch No. 1 of the  
3rd of January I have now the honour to transmit  
six copies of the draft Estimates for 1916-17,  
together with twelve copies of the Treasurer's  
Budget Statement and two copies of Schedules of  
differences between the ~~estimated~~ estimates for  
the current year and the ~~draft~~ estimates for  
1915-16.

2. The Appropriation Bill was read a first  
time during the recently concluded Session of the  
Legislative Council and was left in Committee at  
the second reading in order that any necessary  
amendments could be made at the next Session.

3. You will observe that, as predicted in  
paragraph 9 of my Confidential despatch No. 175  
of November 12th, I am able to submit for your  
consideration a Budget which balances without  
drawing on our reserves of assets and that  
provision is included under Schedule 35 for  
interest on overdraws or borrowings necessitated  
by unforeseen war disbursements. In connection  
with the above reference to the "reserve of assets"  
it

it is necessary for me to explain that, although the balance of such assets figures at £113,589, as shown in Appendix B to the draft estimates, the whole of our disbursements under "War Expenses" at present appears in a Suspense Account and is thus included amongst our "assets". The available liquid assets are at present nil and the ultimate amount of net assets cannot be determined, or even estimated, until a decision has been arrived at as to what, if any, financial assistance will be forthcoming in aid of war expenditure incurred by the Protectorate.

4. The Treasurer has explained in his budget statement that the provision of a certain sum (£6250) under the head "Loan Charges" is of the nature of a direct contribution towards the expenses contingent on the War. I do not propose in this despatch to dwell further on the subject of war expenditure beyond remarking that the final allocation and adjustment of such expenditure, to which I alluded in paragraph 8 of my despatch of November 12th, will be rendered still more difficult because of the amalgamation of the Indian Expeditionary Forces B and C and the placing of them, together with the Protectorate regular and volunteer forces, under one command which is responsible both for the defence of British East Africa and for certain offensive measures against German East Africa.

5. The Treasurer has dwelt generally with the financial outlook in his budget statement and I would refer specially to paragraphs 2, 6, 7, 14, 17, 18 and 24 of that statement. It is of course regrettable

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regrettable that, just at this stage of the development of the Protectorate, when steadily improving financial conditions were beginning to enable us to introduce various such new changes in pattern of administration as will, as we embark on independent status, help to render utility in every other office, remuneration and housing of the staff, we should have to face the serious problem which is one of the inevitable results of the war, namely, however, convincing that the setback is only of a temporary nature and that the Protectorate will return to normalcy on the cessation of hostilities. This statement is put forward by the Administrative Officers and the Heads of Departments and their Agents that our democratic economies have become increasingly disrupted and, in some cases, disruption has had to be postponed, but it gives me great satisfaction to record that one and all fully realise the situation and have cheerfully and loyally assisted me in giving effect to those measures which have become necessary for preparing the budget for the next financial year.

I have also considered it desirable to provide during 1915-16 for any new amount of revenue, nor to increase the amount of any tax or fee already leviable. The general rise locally in the prices of commodities, the enormous increase in cost of living necessarily to meet the requirements of the military forces, the heavy expenditure, &c., have all this been taken into account and the necessary

affected every section of the community that I am unable to suggest any method of raising fresh Revenue. If it were not for Treaty obligations it would indeed be possible by a readjustment of our Customs Tariff to obtain some additional Revenue from the importation of certain classes of goods but as matters stand this is of course out of the question. I am still earnestly considering the possibility of increasing the Native Hut and Poll Tax and Mr Ainsworth is at present engaged in touring the Protectorate with a view to obtaining full information on the subject by personal investigation in the various native reserves. In no case, however, shall such increase be brought into operation before April 1916, and next year's finances would therefore not be affected in any way should an increase in, or redistribution of the incidence of, the tax be decided upon as a result of Mr Ainsworth's report.

7. I have therefore been obliged to fall back on reduction of expenditure as the only means of producing a self-contained budget. The Schedules of differences enclosed in this despatch show in detail the reductions and economies which I propose to effect. At the same time I have, after due consideration, decided to ask you to approve of a limited number of increases in the emoluments of certain posts and I hope that no objection I find that is now imminent can be raised for an increase has already been made and that it cannot be argued that it is necessary for those

concerned if consideration of their claims were to be further delayed. I have therefore included the increased rates of salary proposed in your Confidential despatch of the 21st of July for the Assistant Chief Secretary, the Treasurer, the Chief of Customs, the Principal Medical Officer, the Postmaster General, the Attorney General and the Commissioner of Police.

With reference to your despatch No. 10114 of November 1941 I am willing to defer action on the subject of the proposed increase of Pay Scale until the 1st January 1942, or of 1943 being considered. In my despatch No. 10116 of November 1941 I outlined the proposal for increase of the scale according to the new scale of salaries recommended by the Pay Board. I hope that you will allow it to stand. Your despatch of 21st November, in accordance with the Pay Department, which was reported to you in my despatch No. 979 of 20th October 1941, is of a personal nature as my recommendation did not affect the scale already proposed for the post in question. I trust that your approach will also be forthcoming to the special increases of salary (within the sanctioned scale) which I have submitted for your consideration.

b. With reference to my despatch No. 980 of September 1941 and your telegram of November 10th on the subject of the salary and emoluments of the members of the Legislative Assembly, I enclose hereto to report that, without consideration of the whole proposal, will soon

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the point of view of the decrease in traffic due to the war and bearing in mind the financial position generally, I directed the Acting General Manager to make provision in his draft estimates for the whole of the increased staff and strengthened equipments, as recommended by me in my despatch now under reference, with the exception of one Assistant Locomotive Superintendent and ~~one~~ one Assistant Traffic Manager. In this connection I would however state that the Crown Agents have been requested not to proceed with the engagement of ~~any~~ staff nor the filling of any existing vacancies without special instructions for each case. Further, until the "S.S. Aspinwall" is replaced it will in any case not be necessary to engage the additional staff previously required for the S.S. "Aspinwall" since the crew of the former vessel will in the meantime be available for the latter. Thus appreciable savings may be anticipated on the Railway Superintendents Staff for 1915-16 as provided in the draft estimates though I have considered it desirable to make full provision as if all Railway departmental vacancies were to be filled and the full number of vessels to be in commission.

9. In dealing with the Schedules of expenditure I propose only to refer to those items which appear to me to call for additional information to what is contained in the budget statement and in the "Explanations" column of the Schedule of differences. I wish, however, first to explain that I have copied the normal annually recurring

recurrent expenditure under other headings to be reduced generally throughout the various Departments. I am aware that even with the strictest economy the reduced provision is in some cases almost sure to prove inadequate and I am looking to the savings which invariably occur under "personal emoluments", an account of leave pay and vacancies, to cover any small excesses under "Other Charges". It has necessarily been found necessary, after the estimates for a year have been approved, to provide for additional unestimated expenditure from "Savings". During 1915-16 for the reasons given above this will not be possible - or will only be possible to a very limited extent - and it will be necessary to assume that all savings will require to be earmarked for possible charges on other services and will not be available for fresh services.

Should it, however, become probable in the course of the year that the estimated Revenue will be exceeded I trust that I shall be authorized to lay before Council a supplementary estimate increasing the provision for the recurrent expenses of those Departments whose activities will necessarily be restricted by the policy of economy I have been forced to adopt, and, so far as possible, for providing some additional expenditure on Public Works.

(2) Under Schedule 3 I have reduced the provision for my local travelling by one-half an, during the consideration of hostilities. It will

It is necessary for me to explain that although the full number of 31 is shown in the draft estimates, the monetary provision of Rs 9,350 is only sufficient for the 50 officers who were actually on the strength at the time that the estimates were being submitted. At that time I had asked that some of the existing vacancies should be filled but I was later obliged to reconsider this recommendation on account of the large number of the administrative staff who are seconded for military or other special duty arising out of the war. A reference to the Staff List will show that on January 1st, one Provincial Commissioner, three District Commissioners and ten Assistant District Commissioners were thus employed. Of the Assistant District Commissioners two are serving with the Bengal Army in Europe and two locally.

with the General Officer and Staff. It may also at any time become necessary to second two additional officers, viz Mr Shadley and Gen. G. Dundas. As the salaries of officers seconded locally are being charged to "War Expenses" and as the War Office is charged with the pay of those serving with the regular Army, Senatorial provision for the full number of 81 will not be required.

For 1915-16 and I consider that the sum of £100 per annum will suffice. I was further influenced in this instance to amend my previous request and to make a liability of vacancies by the month also contained in your Estimate of £100 per annum. This liability would be anticipated in calculating the 1st-1st in January of a later date, say 1916. I prefer that the same be apprehended from the date of the beginning of the full complement. At the same time, it appears to be necessary to show the full necessary strength in the Estimates.

I have provided a day allowance at the rate of £100 per annum, for the Officer in charge of the Naval Reserve, which I trust will suffice to start. The duties of this officer are of a very responsible nature and types of a executive character and since the Naval Reserve is organized on a separate footing I consider that distinct compensation is always due. Should a special duty allowance be in the case of Scotland and the Northumbrian Frontier District. Should my proposal not meet with your approval it will be necessary to add £100 per annum for district Commissions, etc, etc.

The allowances for Assistants to Provincial Commissioners are reduced from five in number to four as the appointments will only be made in the Provinces of Seyidie, Umarba, Kenya and Nyanza.

I consider it safe to reduce the provision for passages of the General Staff by £1500 as the granting of leave will probably be very much restricted. Under "Province of Jubaland" I have reduced the provision for Jubaland transport by £1000 as the complete approved scheme for the administration of the Province will not be in operation throughout the year and will probably not even be inaugurated during the year.

Under "Northern Frontier District" lump sum votes have been taken for the pay and expenses of the Armed Constabulary and for the expenses in accordance with the approval contained in your Confidential despatch of November 16th. Lump sum votes for the Jubaland Province and the Northern Frontier District have similarly been provided under Schedule 6, Provincial Administration, Special Expenditure.

11. Under Head 7, Treasury, I have, after consultation with the Governor of Uganda who, I understand is doing the same, made provision for a new grade of "Senior Assistant Treasurers". Sir Macario Jackson and I are agreed that the prospects of Treasury Assistants should be improved in view of the comparatively slow rate of promotion in the Department. Five of the ten assistants in the East Africa Treasury have from seven to twelve years service in the department. This provision was raised by the Governor of

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Uganda at the end of 1915, but I informed him that I was not prepared to refer it to you until the estimates for 1916-17 were under consideration. I trust that you will be able to improve our ~~recommendations~~ which entail a very significant increase in expenditure so far as the Post Office Department is concerned, assuming that the three senior Assistants will be promoted to the new grade.

The detailed estimate for the Audit Department has not yet been readyed by me from the Director of Colonial Audit. The figures inserted in Schedule 10 having been furnished by the Auditor from information received by him by me. I presume that the estimates have already been submitted to you direct and that they will provide the increased emoluments for the Auditor as approved in your Confidential Letter of August 4th.

Under Head 12, Police, I have been forced to provide extra for local allowances to Police stationed in Mbarara and Mbale. The Commissioner of Police has reported a growing unsatisfactoriness of service in the larger towns owing to the high cost of living, longer hours of duty, etc., and has asked that a monthly allowance of Ru.2 per man for all African ranks below that of Assistant Sub-Inspector may be sanctioned as from April 1st, 1916. I have satisfied myself of the reasonableness of this request and of the fact that a refusal would seriously affect both the recruiting of Police and their subsequent retention in the force.

I have therefore no option but to submit the recommendation for your favourable consideration.

In connection with the Police Department estimates I wish to record the fact that it was with the very greatest reluctance that I was obliged to disallow the increase of strength originally asked for by the Commissioner. The estimates as first submitted showed an increase of £2781 on ordinary existing services and provision of no less than £6182 on new services. The following additional staff has been instead:-

1 Assistant Superintendent,

5 Inspectors.

7 European Constables.

4 Sub-Inspectors,

152 African Police.

Under normal conditions I should have had no hesitation in supporting this estimate, but, as matters stand, I was compelled to instruct the Commissioner to disallow all provision for the increase of the Police Force. The requirements of this Department will be among the first to receive sympathetic consideration when the financial situation improves.

Under Schedule 13, Prisons, I have been able to effect a reduction of 25 sixth grade Warders as I consider that it will be possible to carry on with a lesser number. I have not however been able to provide a corresponding decrease in the subhead for "Warders' Uniforms" the previous provision being inadequate.

involved being reallocated for some other educational service. Of the two alternatives I would recommend the latter. I had hoped to be able to submit a very strong case for increasing the educational facilities in the Protectorate to meet the steadily increasing demands of the European community. I have, however, been forced to limit my recommendations for increase of staff, apart from the Inspector, to one assistant master, one assistant mistress and an assistant matron for the Nairobi Division "A" School and one assistant teacher for the Mombasa Division "B" School. I earnestly hope that you will approve of this small increase, which is very badly needed, more especially as by economies in other directions I have been able to reduce the vote by over £900. As predicted in my despatch No 904 of October 26th I have abandoned the projected establishment of the Nyanza North Kavirondo Native School.

14. As the whole Military situation will require to be carefully reviewed on the cessation of hostilities, and as it seems extremely likely that the recently approved reorganisation proposals will then no longer meet the altered circumstances of the Protectorate, I have been in some doubt as to how to prepare the Military Estimates for 1915-16. After consultation with the Officer Commanding Troops I eventually decided not to provide any increase in the numbers of the rank and file but to divide the existing force up under infantry, cavalry, mounted infantry and illadoes so as to shew at least the nucleus of the Inspector General's recommendations. I have further provided a lump sum vote of £1,000 under Schedule 18a, Military Special Expenditure, against which any extension of the reorganisation ~~expense~~<sup>expenses</sup> can be charged. Although as stated above I have not increased the number

rank and file, the rearrangement of the forces even on the limited scale which has been adopted has necessitated certain increases in European Officers and followers, and I have also felt justified in strengthening the clerical establishment. I have further increased the "Serenli Military Transports" to the minimum requirements of that unit. Pending a decision on the future volunteer forces of the Protectorate I have deleted all provision under the sub-head "Volunteer Reserve" retaining only the Armourer Sergeant who is shewn under a new sub-head "Armoury Establishment". The net result shows an increase of £4,616 for Recurrent military expenditure and a decrease of £1,396 under Extraordinary Military Expenditure.

15. The greatest care has been exercised in the preparation of the Railway Estimates. A decrease of earnings of £138,000 as compared with 1914-15 is estimated. It has of course not been possible to reduce expenditure by a similar amount but the proportion of expenditure to earnings has been reduced from 58.5% in 1914-15 to 57.9% in 1915-16. The decrease in the net earnings is estimated at £53,374.

Under Schedule 22, Agricultural Department, I have effected economies to the extent of £4,157. To do this it has been necessary to reduce very considerably the provision for purchase of livestock for and upkeep of the various Government Farms. I have been obliged to disregard requests of the Director of Agriculture and the Chief Veterinary Office for additional staff, and to postpone until a more favourable occasion the consideration of the many admirable arguments they have put forward for the increase of the

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activities of their Departments.

Under Schedule 22a - Agricultural Department Special Expenditure - I have inserted £1,000 for the dipping scheme. The amount so provided is totally inadequate but will at least ensure some continuation of the policy recently inaugurated.

The sum of £100 for "Expenses under the Coconut Ordinance" is intended by a corresponding amount shown in Revenue. The necessary legislation for controlling coconut plantations was passed at a recent Session of the Legislative Council and I will address you on this subject in a separate despatch.

Under Schedule 25, Survey Department, a decrease is shown and I hope this will be savings which I hope to be able to effect by restricting the field duties of the Department and by employing the staff to a greater extent in the office. Reductions in the travelling and transport costs will thus be possible.

In spite of a very greatly reduced public works programme I have not found it possible to reduce any of the Public Works Department staff. On the contrary I have considered it desirable slightly to augment the staff of the drawing office in order that the opportunity afforded by the reduced programme of new construction may be seized to employ a large portion of the Public Works Department staff in the office. The Department has in the past suffered considerably from the fact that shortness of staff has not made it possible for plans and drawings of projected works to be prepared in advance. It is therefore somewhat consolation that the necessity for cutting down expenditure on Public Works Expenditure will at least enable the Department

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to establish itself on a more satisfactory footing than hitherto. The reductions which it has been possible to effect under "Other Charges" are self-explanatory.

No appreciable decrease has been possible under "Public Works Recurrent" but the "Public Works Extraordinary" expenditure is shewn at £30,000 as against £104,755 for the current year. Of this £30,000, £7,000 for Road Construction is contingent on an equivalent amount being realised from sale of Crown Leases, £17,900 is in connection with the Mombasa Water Supply reported to you in my despatch No 935 of November 6th and a balance of £5,100 is available for other Public Works. It is not possible at present to indicate the details of the expenditure against this latter sum. As you are aware the annual requirements of Heads of Departments chargeable to Public Works Extraordinary have invariably had to be very considerably reduced when the estimates come up for consideration and I propose to husband the small provision in the 1915-16 estimates with the utmost care and to authorise only such minor and petty works as appear to me to be really indispensable, considering each request on its merits as it arises. I had, at one time, contemplated enclosing with this despatch a schedule of urgent Public Works for which no provision can for the present be made, but on reconsideration I am of opinion that no useful purpose would be served by doing so before an improvement in the financial outlook affords some prospect of funds being available for additional expenditure.

17. I regret very much the delay which has occurred in submitting the Estimate for 1916-1918 but you will realise that the preparation has been attended by the greatest difficulty apart from the fact that I have been obliged to devote a considerable amount of time to military matters.
