I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt  
of your despatch No. 86 of the 22nd of January  
respecting the sale of oil fuel to the public by  
the Government and to state in reply that I am not  
in favour of the suggestion made by Mr. E. W. Cowan  
on this subject.

2. Please sign our agreement with the Anglo-Persian Oil Company needs:-

"The buyers guarantee that the fuel oil purchased under this agreement is solely for their own requirements and undertake not to resell the same".

3. Apart from the condition imposed in this clause I do not consider it is desirable that the administration should make any of their changes to the public service in either the civil or military departments without consulting the members of the service concerned before making any such changes.
