I have the honour to refer to your despatch No. 35 of the 5th ultimo respecting the arrest of Mr J. Hill.

- 2. We will was in the first instance arrested together with Messrs Schauer and Welter as a deuman subject but on arrival at mairobi he was able to satisfy the Provest Mershal that he was of British nationality and he was accordingly released.
- 3. He was embsequently re-arrested under Hantial Law owing to the suspicious circumstances in connection with the Kijabs Sanatorium asserbed in the enclosure to my despatch No. 993 of Hovember 24th, but after two or three days detention was again released.
- As he had no means of support he applied to Government for assistance and was grated a free second-class passage by the 3.5.

To His Excellency the Governor Government House,

Nairobi.

Sir,

Heferring to my tetter of the 25th ult., to your forwarding same to Lieut. Celonel ward, and to his reply on the 25th idem, I have now been informed by the Commissioner of Police that the Government are willing to grant me an assisted package to England in respect of one half its value.

As I have absolutely no financial rescurces and as my present position is entirely owing to the action of the Government, I consider this concession to be very unsatisfactory.

As it is probable that the facts of my case have either been ignored or underestimated, I humbly beg to reiterate to Your Excellency the details of my previous communication.

I am er ployed by Schauer, Welter & Co. of Kijabe Hill as Bookkeeper and Correspondent, having entered in b such service on July 9th of this year. But owing to hosiflittes I was arrested together with my employers on August 8th and after spending one night in Nairobi Gaol was allowed to return to Kijabe the following morning. Subsequently I was re-arrested, taken to Naivasha, interrogated by the P.C. and D.C.

there

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there, and ordered to be taken to the 'Intelligence Office' at Nairobi; but instead of this action being taken, I was put into prison, where I remained three days, and after that period was transferred to the Government School with German prisoners, remaining there about a week.

It is now a month ago since I was released on parole; but finding it impossible to obtain simployment, and having exhausted all my means of existence - my <u>July</u> salary constituting my sole resources - I was compelled to protest against such treatment of a British subject in my letter of the 25th ultimo.

Having been taken from my position without means of self-support, and my future in the Protectorate having been ruined, I consider, that in the interests of justice, my case should receive more consideration than the concession as stated by the Commissioner of Police, and should be brought before Your Excellency's notice.
