The question of the construction of the railway from Voi to Maktau has been thoroughly discussed with Mr Sutherland (a railway officer who accompanied the force from India) and it was decided to wire to the War Office advocating the construction. It is estimated that the time required for construction would be about 5 months, and it is practically certain that no large reinforcements will arrive in the country sooner than that

The cost of the railway is estimated at £50,000 and it is probable that half of this would be recovered by sale of material on the conclusion of the operations. The only material which would have to be obtained from India is 35 miles of permanent way, with iron sleepers, and a slight increase for the staff.

An alternative proposal is that India should send over 40 kiles of railway material from the Delhi Durbar stock.

RESUME OF WAR DIARY

Malleson reporting his arrival at Rutchuru, where he visited Commandant Henri. The purport of the negotiations so far is that nothing can be done in the way of co-operation on the Belgian side until after the arrival of their expected supplies of ammunition, &c. The question of co-operation was very favorably received, but before plans can be definitely formulated more details on certain points are required. General Malleson remains at Rutchuru for the present.

A concentration of Belgram forces is in progress towards Ruanda; this probably accounts for German movements in that district as reported in Tatelligence Diary of 20th February.

Enemy's patrols have recently visited Marjorent and Kikoneni.

The Turkhana Expedition is reported as Progressing favorably. Large captures of stock are reported.

A apy was executed in Voi recently; this has caused a profound impression in the district.

It has been pointed out very clearly that any operations contemplated before the completion of the railway to Maktau must be confined to the Lake area and must have the approval of the War Offige.

A naval demonstration could be arranged for to synchronise with such an operation in the interior, but no serious attack could be considered.

The work of construction of the Voi-Maktau railway will commence at once, and the railway companies, R.E., have been moved there to assist.
