Your Excellency,

With reference to Mr Walker's despatch No. 4 of February 21st concerning the expenditure necessary for the new Consular post at Moga, I have the honour to state that there is only one point on which I have any suggestion to offer and that is regarding the transport. It has I think been overlooked that, while Mr Hodson will require mule transport to take him to Moga, once he is there mules will be useless for local purposes of transport and he will require camels, which will both be cheaper and more effective. I would therefore suggest that Mr Hodson should purchase his mules here on behalf of the East African Government and on arrival at Moga he should hand them over to the authorities at Moyale either for local use or for transfer to Nairobi as may be thought most desirable.

Mr Hodson's journey down to Moga would thus cost the Government practically nothing as he would have had the use of Government mules for his transport down and any additional expense would be covered by the enhanced value of

value of the mules in the Protectorate.

Mr Hodson could then purchase eight camels locally to serve him for his journeys along the frontier or hire as he finds most convenient. In my opinion a combination of these two systems would be best and I think Mr Hodson should rely mostly on hired animals for his journeys and keep 6 or 8 camels of his own for light work or emergencies, as nothing would be easier than for the Abyssinians in any crisis to prevent his travelling by passing round word that no camels were to be hired out to him, a command which the Borana would not dare to disobey.

The provision made in the Estimate for riding mules for his escort would remain untouched.

The whole question of Mr Hodson's expenditure for the first year must be somewhat in the nature of an experiment and apart from the above alteration I concur in all that Mr Walker has laid down. It is difficult to say what the cost of Mr Hodson's camel transport will be but I should think that the total will amount to somewhat less than in Mr Walker's estimate. I believe that good camels can be purchased in cash and when not in use they should be grazed in the low country in a Boran village, 2 men being hired to look after them.

With regard to hiring camels for his journeys I would suggest that Mr Hodson should send in his accounts quarterly under a separate heading and section B in the estimate would thereby be eliminated and paragraph 5 of a section B would need some modification, as probably

probably 4 armed men would be sufficient as a guard for his transport and the other five would need to be replaced by local camel men at a cheaper rate.
