Sir,

I have the honour to bring to your notice the fact that the officers and clerks employed at Kisii station have lodged claims on account of losses said to have been sustained by them consequent on the German invasion of the Kisii district in September last.

2. I attach hereto copies of six claims which aggregate £427.7.8 and would ask you to give the matter your consideration.

3. The circumstances are briefly as follows:-

(a) Owing to the news that the enemy were advancing rapidly on Kisii, the District Commissioner evacuated the station on the night of the 9th September.

- (b) The advance of the enemy did not prove to be as rapid as was anticipated, and they did not arrive at Kisii till the early morning of 11th September.
- (c) The time that elapsed between the evacuation by the District Commissioner and his staff, and the arrival of the enemy was occupied by the Kisii natives in looting the Police lines and the adjacent Swahili location.
- (d) After the engagement between our troops and the enemy on 12th September, and during the time that the former were retiring on Repdu and the latter were fleeing for German territory, the natives again took advantage of the fact that the station was unoccupied and resumed their work of looting.
- (e) On this occasion they broke into every Government building, and wantonly destroyed the contents, with the result that the officers and clerks in question have suffered considerable pecuniary loss.

4. On due consideration and after discussion with my Executive Council I am of opinion that compensation should be granted,


