Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your confidential despatch of August 28th and to extend a suppy of a letter from the General Sanagor commenting on the explanation offered by Lieutanant R.N. Reynolds, k.N.K. in regard to the criticism on his Department contained in the report of the Commission appointed to enquire into the Traffic Working of the Commission Railway.

- 2. I am of opinion that in Eastwood's remarks are perhaps a little severe, though it is doubtless natural that he should support the view in which the had previously concurred as a Hember of the Communion.

SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES, DOWNING STREET, LONDON, S.W. that the directions given to the Commission compelled them to investigate all mattern of complaint and that the deficiencies brought to light in the working of the Harine Division were not recorded as an independent against himself but as matters domaining remedial action. Their existence would tell against himself only in so far as it could be shown that they might have been avoided by the exercise of more efficient supervision.

- the Marine Division has been impeded in recent times by the difficulties to which Lieutenant Reynolds refers, and, as I do not find it proved that any deficiency was directly due to neglect or omission on his part.

 I am prepared to assume that he has done his best under difficult conditions, and to acquit him of blame for their existence.
- 5. I am more concerned with the improvements to be effected in the future than with the causes of the defects disclosed by the report, and if, when the situation again becomes normal, all officers boncerned consistently endeavour to guard against a resourcement of the sources of complaint I think that the investigation made by the Commission will have served a useful end.
- 6. I have caused Lieutenant Reynolds to be informed in terms of the three preceding paragraphs and consider that no useful purpose will be served by pursuing the matter further.

In connection with the Traditio forking Seport of the Ugunds Railway, and the copy of correspondence with it Reynolds, Marine Superintendent, ferempted by the Secretary of State, forming an analogure to your latter, I have the honour to state that I do not propose, unless it is openially desired that I should do so, to answer in detail every point raised by Mr. Reynolds, but merely to comment on the items in which he claims to have been unfairly spenned and maligned.

(2). The General Manager called a Committee to enquire lintothe working of the Sallway conceally, and into all metters, which sended disentisfaction or inconvenience to the Proding community in regard to the Sanaring and carriage or given by the Railway, so that he might be made aware of all sound instances in which the public and his own staff considered the Railway failed in its obligations, and he could, in sonsequence of the knowledge of obtained take such meteures as would prevent and correct the requirence of thy similar complaints in the future, and in no sense was the enquiry instituted with the intention of bringing thergon against

(3). The report was drawn up on information estained from

- (4). The complaints made by the Traders were not debated and entered into in detail, and unless any complaint was obviously inadequate or frivolous it was not discussed. These was no reason why it should be. It was not an enquiry to enter into and report upon any one specific case, it was not enquiry to learn what disabilities the traders considered they suffered from, to give the Bailway Administration the apportunity of remedying such disabilities where they might sounally occur or exist.
- (5). The intertion as to the sphere of enquiry, in the first place, was the Railway from Hombasa to Milindini, and it was instituted with that intention only, but the result of the enquiries at Hombasa pointed so much in one sireotten that it was considered necessary to extend its operations to the lake Ports.

(7). The conditions under which the gagairy was conducted,

most effectually disposes of the objection that complaints may be made about an absent person that would not be made if such person were present. Statements were made quite as freely and without reserve concerning the Rathway part of our system, as they were of the Marine, they are recorded . with equal Kalness and truthfulness, and the report is signed by the efficer who is avaponable for the work in connection with them, the Traffic Manager. If the Marine Superintendent had been appointed a member of the Committee he would, as a nember of the enquiry, have had either to sign the report to which he now objects, or to draw up a "minority report", which in view of the fact that all the compents regarding his department were wide by the Trading community, or from our own actual charge trans, could scarcely have differed in any natural degree from that tendered by the three other members of the Committee. (8). If the General Manager for his own information wishes the warking of the system he is administering to be reported upon he has every right to appoint who he considers most suitable and capable for the work. (15). I think that these semants amply and fully refute the allegations of Mr. Deprochs of unfair or biased treatment against him. In dompiling the report it was enteave, oured to show what we had been requested to do, visit to point out what grounds existed for complaint amongst the trading community, and this being the case there is somewall a word in the report which could honeatly have been omation or left unwritten.

(16). I informed Mr. Reynolds personally of the general contents and effect of this letter at the time he returned from leave.
