REGULATIONS

IMPROVING PASSPORTS.

1. Applications for Protectorate Passports must be made in the form provided for that purpose and filled in a form attached to "The Protectorate Handbook." Forms may be obtained at the Secretariat or at the office of the various Provincial Comptroller Generals.

2. The charge for a Passport is Rs. 5. Passports are issued at the Secretariat during Office hours. Applicants who do not reside in Nairobi are unable to attend at the Secretariat in person, may send their applications by post enclosing a certificate for the amount due. Passports so granted will be sent to them at the address given. Postage stamps will not be accepted in payment of passport fee.

3. Protectorate Passports are granted only

- (1) To natural born British subjects.
- (2) To the wives and widows of such persons and
- (3) To persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.
- (4) To Natives of British Protectorates.

A married woman is deemed to be a subject of the State of which her husband is for the time being a subject.

4. Passports are granted to such persons as are known to the Government, or recommended to him by some person who is known to him, or

Upon the production of a declaration by the applicant in the form provided for that purpose verified by a declaration made by any Justice of the Peace, Magistrate, Minister of Religion, Doctor, Lawyer, or Public Official of the Protectorate. The applicant's Certificate of Birth may also be required.

5. If the applicant for a Passport be a Naturalized British subject, the Certificate of Naturalization must be produced with the Declaration or Letter of Recommendation.

Naturalized British subjects will be described as such in their Passports, which will be issued subject to the necessary specifications.

6. Every application for a passport must be accompanied by a photograph of the applicant, and one of his wife, if the passport is to include her. The dimensions of the photographs should conform with the necessary specifications.

7. The passport of the applicant's family or household, unless otherwise directed by the Government, will be issued with the passport of the wife. In all other cases a separate passport is required.

8. Protectorate Passports are not available beyond the year from the date of issue. They may be renewed for two further periods of two years each after which a new passport will be required.

9. Holders of passports should return to the Secretariat, at the end of the period of their validity, a copy of the passport, which will be retained for reference.

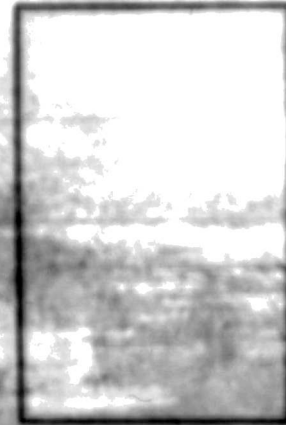

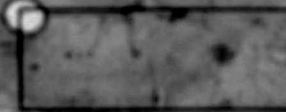

PASSPORTRule

2. I had previously received your telegram of the 29th ultimo and caused a local form of passport to be prepared which I hope will fulfil the necessary requirements. I enclose a copy for your approval.

3. In order to meet the increased cost incurred in printing and binding the new passports a rule, a copy of which I attach, has been issued under the Passport Fees Ordinance 1904 raising the fee payable to Rs. 5.
