THE LEGACY AMENDMENT ORDINANCE, 1914.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of the Legacy Amendment Ordinance, 1914, is to enable the manager of the estate situated in the Protectorate of a lunatic residing elsewhere than in the Protectorate to remit sums realized from the estate to the Court of the country in which such lunatic resides or to some person responsible for the lunatic's estate in such country.

2. Under the Indian (District Courts) Legacy Act, 1914, as applied to the Protectorate all sums received by a manager on account of an estate in excess of what may be required for the current expenses of the lunatic or of the estate must be paid to the Treasury on account of the estate for investment (vide Section 14). If the lunatic resides without the Protectorate and has the major part of his property outside the Protectorate, it is, in my opinion, reasonable that the Court should have power to order the transfer of any surplus funds to the country in which the lunatic resides.

3. The power given to the Court has been purposely left general in order that the Court's order may be adaptable to any set of circumstances which may arise.
