SIR,

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor to acknowledge with thanks the contents of your letter of May 14th enclosing a draft for Rs 10,000/- being the amount of a contribution made by the Sikhs of British Segregation to the Government War Relief Fund.

2. I am to request you to convey to the Sikhs before the next general meeting of His Excellency and of the Committee of the Fund for War relief gift, and to assure them that the same shall be expended in rendering assistance to citizens of the Commonwealth who may have suffered by the War, and in rendering aid of whatever nature their families and dependents. I am to add that His Excellency desires with great pleasure that the Sikhs people to support the cause of the British Government.

3. It is further desired that you will inform the contributions that their general and of liberality and charity will be brought to the notice of His Excellency's Principal Secretary or those for the Sikhs.

4. His Excellency requests that you will convey to Mr. Gray his thanks for the part he has taken in collecting the contributions.

for having learnt of a sum in the character of the Alaska previously unexpended by me, namely, their remittance to an appeal, touching their cause, on behalf of the Treatment and Country."

In informing His Excellency of this presentation will you be so kind enough as to draw his attention to Mr. Gray's suggestion that the money be used to relieve distress among natives who have suffered through the War.

This money has been authorized by the Governor and as the Alaska have no real "Chief" authority His Excellency would personally acknowledge receiving it and I will be able to tell the people concerned that the letter is in the Civil Office.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward herewith draft for Rs.10,643-60 for His Excellency's War Fund. This sum is made up of cash and the proceeds of sale of 170 head of cattle and 390 sheep and goats, after deducting expenses presented by the Akashas of Mumoni location. I had presented to the above Fund.

Mrs. H.W. Gray Asst. District Commissioner was on Safari in March last and visited the Akashas of Mumoni which was at that time in the hands of the official Regiments of the RAF.

The idea of voluntary and generous support from each sub-location visited and I was agreeably surprised when I returned to Mumoni to find, even among the small and scattered villages in the neighbourhood which are poor in cattle, that they had actually set aside money for the matter and decided what contribution they would make without my having said anything to them on the subject. Their gifts were brought into Mumoni.

I mention this as showing how entirely voluntarily these people have subscribed and indeed, would subscribe again if necessity arose.

I know nothing of the finances of His Excellency's War Fund but I am sure that there can be no question that money subscribed will find endless deserving persons to which to be applied, as again in Burma there will always be numerous deserving cases of soldiers and dependents of war who would be relieved from anxiety by the receipt of funds I certainly feel myself the richer for
