Sir,

I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of the proceedings of a Medical Board held for the purpose of reporting on the health of Mr. P. P. Quiterio, 2nd grade clerk, together with a copy of his Medical History.

2. The Board recommend that Mr. Quiterio should be invalided from the service and I have approved their recommendation accordingly.

3. Mr. Quiterio has completed over 13 years service and is therefore eligible for a pension under the Pension Regulations for the Subordinate Staff. His pension is computed at £34. 13. 4. per annum and the necessary form of particulars is forwarded herewith.

Has been in East Africa 22 years with the exception of his leave which he has always taken when due.

17 years ago pains began in his left arm and got worse for 2 years when he resigned and went to India for 9 months.

He then got better and was reinstated. In August 1901 he got a sudden pain in his chest at night and ever since then he has had pains which have gradually got worse.

Three months ago was the first time he became unconscious during an attack.

He has had very little Malaria and 1 attack of dysentery this year no other illnesses.

He was admitted to Native Hospital on May 6 and has been under observation and treatment since.

He has had three very severe attacks of Angina pectoris and many slight ones.

He has not improved under treatment or only to a very small extent.

His heart is irregular but shows no signs of organic disease.

Other organs healthy.

Instructions referred to on page 1

If this Paper of Particulars and the Certificate connected with it, be not sent in original, the copies must be duly attested.

Head 1 of Paper.—In the case of an Officer retiring on the West Colonial Africa, a statement is to be added whether or not he was entitled to the Colonial Regulations, 1902.

Head 2.—State the description of Allowance for which the Applicant is re-imbursed, viz. Superannuation Compensation, Compassionate Allowance, or Gratuity, and its amount. In the case of Persons claiming an addition to their Pension in respect of Professional or other special qualifications, this should be stated, and a reference should be given to the authority under which the claim is made.

Head 3.—If the service has been interrupted by one or more breaks, the word "broken" should be added before or after the number of years and months, and the causes, dates, and circumstances of the break or breaks should be stated under heading 2.

Head 6.—If the Person retiring has been in receipt of the same Salary in the class from which he retires, for the 36 months immediately before the date of his retirement, the actual annual rate of Salary or Wages at that date should be inserted, preceded by the word "actual." In other cases the average annual amount of Salary or Wages for the 36 months next preceding the date of retirement should be inserted, preceded by the word "average," but if the whole period of service is less than three years, then the average for the whole period of service should be inserted.

Head 7.—A separate statement should be inserted of the average Annual Value, for the 36 months immediately preceding retirement, of each Fundment (franchise of salary or wages) which is claimed to be included in the calculation of the Pension or Gratuity.

Whenever the value of a House or House Allowance, so ascertained, exceeds one-sixth of the salary and other emoluments which would be the Pension purposes, it is to be reduced to one-sixth of that amount, so that it shall not exceed one-seventh of the whole.

Fees which an Officer is allowed to retain for his services will be taken into account for Pension purposes, with regular salary, at the annual average of the net receipts of the 36 months next preceding the Officer's retirement. These net receipts are to be ascertained by deducting from the gross amount of Fees such Office Expenses, Ac., as an officer may have had to defray from his own resources, in performing the services for which he was remunerated by Fees. No deduction, however, from the Fees should be made in respect of Office Expenses, provided from Public Funds, for the discharge of those duties to which a Fixed Salary is assigned. Papers of "Particulars" when forwarded to the Colonial Department should be accompanied by formal Receipts from the retiring Officer, showing the amount received by them for Fees, and the amount defrayed in return for Office Expenses, Ac., in each of the three years immediately preceding the retirement. It will be the duty of the Colonial Government concerned to satisfy themselves of the accuracy of such statements before forwarding them to the Colonial Office. In the case of Officers receiving Fixed Salaries and Fees, the Fees will not in ordinary circumstances be allowed to count for Pension purposes to the extent of more than one quarter of the Salaries, and there will not in any case be allowed to count for Pension purposes during any period in which the whole time of the Officer receiving them was taken in the Public Service.

Head 8.—In cases of infirmity, if the Applicant is below the ordinary age for retirement, a Medical Certificate is to be furnished, showing that he is disqualified by infirmity of mind or body for discharging the duties of his situation, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent.

In case of ten years' service or more, this Certificate should be signed by two Officers, of whom at least one should, if possible, be a Retired Officer of the Government.

Head 9.—As to "broken" services see Head 3.

If the Applicant has had any "acting" service, the details are to be fully given, with a statement whether or not, during the "acting" service, he was considered with the permanent Civil Service of the Colony.

Head 11.—If, in special circumstances, a professional Civil Officer has been allowed to have "private practice" without forfeiting his claim to Pension, the facts are to be fully stated.

Head 13.—If the Applicant is liable to any deduction from his service under Clause 102 of the Colonial Regulations, the facts should be fully stated.

Head 16.—The length of service and other particulars of the computation are to be given. When an average of Salary, Ac., is taken, the mode of calculating it (whether by months, &c.) is to be explained.
