- 3. I would observe that the Chamber has brought to my notice no instance of unfair action by the Committee affecting any trading firm here.

"That this Chamber decires to represent in the strongest possible manner the situation created by the present constitution of the Central Committee of Supplies, whereby trader intervenes between trader and the Military Authorities in all matters relating to the requisitioning of goods under arbitrar, powers exceeded by Martial Law, and prays are interested to the mercantile community of East Africa, in cases where the differences occur between owners and the central Committee of Supplies in respect of the value to be paid for goods etc; commandeered, it shall be possible for the ewners to take their cases before the Civil Courts, whose decision on all questions will be final. That this facility be granted to the mercantile community in East Africa, as it already has been granted in England.
