2. The London School of Clinical Medicine have no regular course but can arrange one, & say that they can trap the student fully occupied during it.
3. The West London Hospital only gives a course of Clinical lectures & lectures. A little practical work can be done, but this depends to a large extent on the keenness of the individual.

None of these are very satisfactory. Dear Mr. Michelli,

It is thought desirable that medical officers in East and West Africa, should take a course in venereal diseases lasting (say) a month to six weeks.

There are practical difficulties in the way of arranging this, as the leave of officers may not coincide, either with one another, or with the course.

Would it be possible to arrange such a course at the London School of Clinical Medicine, two or three times a year? No guarantee could be given as to the numbers that would attend, or even that some would attend every course, but generally it would

be possible to arrange for the attendance of some three or four.

An attempt has already been made in this direction, but it was found to be of little use in the absence of a definite and organised course.

There is always a difficulty in leaving men attending instruction to their own devices. The keen is all right, but the slacker does nothing at all.

It is thought therefore that if a definite course could be arranged, and those attending it kept fully occupied, that more satisfactory results would be obtained from this instruction in the future, than has been done in the past.

This course in addition to teaching and clinical work, would naturally include practical experience in the giving of the various injections, including salvarsan.

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I feel sure, that with the large amount of clinical material at the London School of Clinical Medicine, this course could be arranged, and I should be very glad if you could let me know, if you think it would be possible to arrange for it, and what fee would be thought proper.

I am writing privately to you so that I can get the necessary information to enable me to advise the Office in the matter.

Dear Mr. Lynch Burgess,

I have your letter and I think that some arrangements may be made at the Clinical School to meet the requirements of the Colonial Office in regard to instructing men in Venereal Diseases.

We have in the wards of the Hospital here always under treatment from 20 to 30 cases and there is I think one of the largest practices in London in the Out-Patient department. Salvarsan is injected in a large number of cases as well as other vaccines which are prepared in the pathological department of the School.

I think it would be possible for the men to be under continuous observation for a month with a definite course of instruction to be got through. If during session we might be able to take on a limited number of men at almost any time convenient to you on giving reasonable notice beforehand. The Sessions at Greenwich differ from those at the Tropical School. There are two in the year, viz:- 1 October to 28 Feb: 1 April to 31 July. These sessions are arranged to meet the convenience of the Admiralty, the great majority of the students being Naval Surgeons.

Dear Dr. Lynch Burgess,

I enclose herewith a suggested syllabus of a course in Syphilis. This is put forward as a basis for discussion and it is hoped that in principle it may meet the requirements of the Colonial Office. It may be necessary to vary it in detail from time to time but the general principle will be maintained.


It is proposed that each course shall extend over a period of 4 weeks and that for this there shall be paid a fee of Five Guineas for each student. One of the conditions which the School will require to be observed is that classes shall be composed of not less than 4 men, and preferably 6, and that there shall be no overlapping of one course by another.

It would be possible to arrange for courses during October, November, December, January and February; also in April, May and June, and it might be possible to arrange a course in July. It would not be necessary for the Course to commence on the first Monday in each month but no tuition can be given during the months of March, August or September.

Of course we cannot promise to follow the men about the Hospital hour by hour but we can ensure that they are in the Hospital and that work is given to them. We must leave something to the keenness of the men themselves. A short examination will be held at the end of each Course and a certificate given to those who have worked and attended satisfactorily.

If it is agreeable to you to come down and have a look at the School some day it will afford me much pleasure to introduce you to our Assistant Dean and Pathologist, Dr. Arthur Davies, who is much interested in the matter and who will take an active part in carrying through and supervising the work of the course. If you will telephone to me when it will be convenient to you to come I will arrange accordingly. I expect to be in my office every morning this week - perhaps you could come down one day at about 11 o'clock.


