

Complaint of Mr. F. J. Pollard against the action of the Customs Department in connection with the non-declaration by him of certain goods liable to duty.

Your No. 12857/3 of the 8th September 1916.

The statements made by Mr. Pollard are not in accordance with the sworn statement of the Customs Clerk who detected the skins, feathers and eggs nor with the facts of the case.

P. The matter was first investigated by Mr. Jones European Officer-in-Charge Customs Preventive Service, and by Mr. Kippage one of my European Assistants and on further enquiry I was satisfied in view of the account of what Mr. Pollard had been in the country, that he could not plead ignorance but that he had deliberately concealed the fact that he was exporting restricted

goods

goods other than the Colobus monkey skin viz., skins liable to export duty and Ostrich eggs and feathers. This view was apparently held by the Magistrate who inflicted the full penalty sued for under section 210 of the Customs Ordinance 1910 notwithstanding the fact that he had power under section 230 to mitigate it to one fourth.

3. Mr. Pollard could produce no evidence that he was an Ostrich Farmer or Feather Merchant. No advice to that effect had reached this Office, but a telegram sent to the Provincial Commissioner, Naivasha, on the day of his visit to me elicited the reply some days after, when Mr. Pollard had called, to the effect that he held an Ostrich Farmer's license. Mr. Pollard was then informed by "Zetter" that his eggs had ~~been~~ could be exported. The Colobus monkey skin cannot be exported except on a Game permit which Mr. Pollard has been unable to produce.

4. Mr. Pollard was not arrested. He came to the Custom House to see about his car which had been detained and saw Mr. Kirscopy one of my European Assistants who brought

brought him up to me as he was not at all satisfied with Mr. Pollard's statements - subsequently he was told by me that he would have to a year before the Magistrate and he and Mr. Jones left together for the airport. The boy after having been cleared subsequently to the hearing of the case in Court was stopped at the Customs Gate by the Askari on duty for the purpose of examination of a custom label in the usual manner but Mr. Pollard appears to have taken exception to this and came back and represented to Mr. Jones that he had been again stopped (he now states arrested) when no attempt had been made on that or any previous occasion to arrest him.

He sent his son to the Kilindini Customs and told the Kilindini Customs Clerk if his boy came for the box he was to be allowed to have it. This was done, and purposely ordered the case to be taken before the Magistrate as I was satisfied that a deliberate attempt had been made to get the skins through without enquiry and to "bluff" the Customs Clerk, and Mr. Pollard's attitude was such as to make it advisable in my opinion that the case should be decided by a Magistrate.

7. Customs Officers are not given "a commission

With reference to the  
letter from this Dept<sup>t</sup> of the

inform you that a report  
has now been received from  
the Govt<sup>t</sup> of the E. A. P. on  
the subject of Mr. F. J. Pollard's  
complaint against the  
Customs Dept<sup>t</sup>.

(a) Under report of the  
import duties in many  
respects from the amount  
furnished to you by Mr.  
Pollard which you embodied in  
your letter to this Dept<sup>t</sup>  
of the 1st of July. The  
facts of the case appear to  
be as follows.

Recon. when this letter  
was first off it was  
not in the hands  
of Mr. Dan & Co.  
but it will  
arrive in due course  
in due course.

(3) Mr. Pollard went to

the Custom House at Montreal  
to see about his case which  
had been delayed, and  
there saw Mr. Kruepp, one of  
the European Assistants.

The letter, not being satisfied with Mr Hollands' statements, took him to the Chief of Customs, and subsequently by <sup>Mr</sup> sent before the magistrate in company with Mr Jones, European Officer-in-Charge,

Customs Preventive Service.  
After the hearing of the case in  
Court, Mr Pollard's box was seized, but it  
was stopped at the Custom,  
but it was released on bail,  
for the purpose of <sup>examining</sup> ~~examining~~  
the Customs label in the  
usual manner. Mr Pollard  
appears

He sent his boy to the  
Kilindini Customs and  
told the clerk that, if  
his boy came for the box,  
he was to be allowed to  
have it. This was done  
accordingly.

(5) It is also explained

that Mr. Pollard could produce no evidence that he was an Orsted Farmer or Dealer in skins, such that no advice to that effect had been ~~given~~ <sup>supplied</sup> to the Customs Office. ~~it was~~ <sup>enough</sup> however, that telegraph that Mr. Pollard held an Orsted Farmers license; but he had already sailed before this became known. He was therefore informed by letter that his eggs & feathers would be reported. The Colobus monkey skin cannot be exported except on a Game permit which Mr. Pollard was not able to produce.

(6). The Chief of Customs add that Customs Officer are not given "a copy" of all forms of documents given to him, according to our approval by the S.P.C.
