The Secretary of the Army Council presents his compliments to The Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. With reference to Sir F. Bertie's telegram No. 199 of August 10th, in which he informed the Foreign Office that the French Government proposed to furnish an Expeditionary Force from Madagascar to operate against German East Africa, Lord Kitchener would be much obliged if Sir Edward Grey would send the following telegram to the French Government :-

"In view of operations now being undertaken on the mainland in East Africa His Majesty's Government would be greatly obliged if the French Government could lend them one French Colonial and one Senegalese Battalion, also one Field and one Mountain Battery, from Madagascar to assist in operations on mainland. His Majesty's Government would arrange transport."
