

Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your despatch
File 5132 9A No. 583 of June 19th ¹⁹¹⁵ respecting the engagement of an
Electric Mechanician to replace Mr. Mundrell and to
attach a memorandum by the Postmaster General
respecting Mr. Carroll who was selected to fill the
vacancy.

2. You will observe that Mr. Gosling, while
pressing for the appointment of a qualified man who
understands the use of Wheatstone Instruments desires
to retain Mr. Carroll's services for general mechanical
work. This involves the creation of a post for which
there is no provision in this year's estimates, nor
has it been included in the draft for 1916-17, which
was complete before the present proposal was brought to
my notice.

3. I can quite understand, however, that owing
to the great pressure of work in the telegraph

Department the arrangement desired by Mr. Gosling is justified by the circumstances of the case and there would appear to be ample savings on his personal emoluments vote to meet the cost this year, and the same will in all probability be the case next year, as several of the European Staff are reverting to the British Post Office and their places will be difficult to fill.


4. I would therefore recommend that Mr. Carroll's services be retained for the present as suggested and that an expert Electric Mechanician with the requisite knowledge of the Wheatstone apparatus be engaged without delay.

5. I may perhaps be permitted to observe that both in Mr. Mundrell's case and in that of Mr. Carroll much inconvenience has been caused owing to the selection by the Crown Agents of a candidate who was not fully qualified to carry out the duties of the post.

A reference to the papers quoted above would show that on the 27th of April of last year you cabled to the Colonial Office asking for the appointment of a First Class Electrical Mechanician with experience of Wheatstone Instruments. The Telegraph Engineer reports that Mr. Orwiston who was appointed to the post, has not the necessary qualifications. Mr. Orwiston also points out that it is absolutely necessary to have a man with these qualifications if our telegraph traffic to be satisfactorily transmitted, and that we must

have

have him at once.

2. We have now reached the stage at which it is impossible to deal efficiently with ^{the} very heavy telegraph traffic except by the use of Westinghouse Automatic transmission, and this automatic requires a highly skilled Mechanic to keep it in good working order. Men with general mechanical abilities are useless. It is a specialised trade. The matter is extremely urgent and I shall be much obliged if the Colonial Office may be cabled accordingly. In order to avoid the sending out of another useless man I would suggest that no Officer be appointed unless he has obtained a certificate from the Officer-in-Charge of the Post Office Factory at Holloway that he has the necessary ability.

3. I propose that Mr. Curran be retained. He can be employed on general mechanical work. At a time like this it is extremely undesirable to dispense with the services of any one who has any sort of mechanical ability.

4. There are considerable savings on salaries for the current financial year and the same will apply next year as several of the men seconded from the British Post Office are returning to that service. There will accordingly be no lack of voted funds available to meet the cost of what would, for the time at least, be a supplementary

appointment.

appointment.

S. I should, perhaps, add that I am afraid that my attempt to obtain a satisfactory Wheatstone Mechanic at the ordinary scale of pay obtaining in this Department would meet with failure. I understand that wages, in England, are inflated owing to the war. The only thing to be done, in my opinion, is to ask the Consulting Engineers to engage a man at such rate of pay as they consider to be fair and reasonable. I regret that I see no alternative to this. The matter is very urgent.
