I have the honour, with reference to your despatch No. 462 of July 1st last (S. 86/14), to transmit to you herewith copy of a Note from the French Minister for Foreign Affairs giving His Excellency's views on the question whether the distillation of alcohol from vegetable products for the purpose of motor fuel is permissible in the African regions covered by the prohibition of the manufacture of distilled liquor under Articles XC and XCI of the Munes's Act of 1890.

Monsieur l'Amiral,

En réifiant à la communication de Votre Excellence en date du 16 juillet dernier, relative au régime des spiritueux en Afrique, j'ai l'honneur de lui faire savoir que je partage l'opinion de Sir Edward Wrey sur le porté des articles 56 et 51 de la Convention de Bruxelles du 2 juillet 1890. Ces articles, qui prohibent la fabrication des boissons distillées dans certaines parties de l'Afrique, ne me paroissent pas s'appliquer à la fabrication, dans les autres régions, des alcools non potables. C'est d'ailleurs dans ce sens, à ma connaissance, que la question a été envisagée par les Conférences qui ont siégé à Bruxelles en 1899, 1906 et 1912.

J'ajoute, pour répondre à la question que Votre Excellence a bien voulu me poser à ce sujet, qu'aucune fabrique d'alcool non potable n'a été créée jusqu'ici dans les territoires dépendant du Gouvernement général de l'Afrique occidentale française. En ce qui concerne les possessions de l'Afrique équatoriale française, les renseignements que j'ai demandés ne me sont pas encore parvenus. Dès que je les aurai reçus, je m'empresserai de les communiquer à Votre Excellence. En tous cas, des instructions ont été données pour soumettre une

une surveillance permanente les distilleries pour la fabrication des spiritueux impropre à la consommation qui viendraient à s'établir sur le territoire français des zones définies aux articles 90 et 91 de la Convention de Bruxelles. En outre l'obligation serait imposée aux fabricants d'ajouter aux alcools un dénaturant suffisamment actif pour empêcher leur revivification et par suite, leur emploi ultérieur comme boisson.

your opinion the account

alcohol in the E.A.P. for
the purpose of the European
population.

2. You will observe that,
in the opinion of the French
Govt., Articles 90 and 91
of the Brussels Convention
of 1890 do not apply to
the manufacture of non-
potable

perable forms of alcohol
in the parts of Africa to
which the Circular refers

3 There is therefore no
objection to your proposal
to prohibit distillation provided
that the spirit is rendered
unintoxicable. For drinking
and as far as possible
against rendering the spirit
open market and against
allowing natives to obtain
possession of such liquors.

4 The necessary legislation
should be effected by an
amendment to section 3
of the Ordinance for Regul-
ating the Sale of Wine
Spirits and Hall Liquors,
N^o 16 of 1909, which
replaced the Distilled Liquor
Ordinance N^o 12 of 1903, referred
to

in para 3 of your despatch
of 8 October a copy of

a Proclamation, N^o 2 of 1910,
of the Govt of N. Nigeria, of
section 3 of which provides
for the distillation, with the
consent of the Govt, of
spirit for purely commercial
and industrial purposes.
This might serve as a model
for the amendment of the
E.A.P. Ordinance. Though you
will probably require to

make provision for the
provide safeguards against traffic
in spirit with native as
afforded in the last para. of your

(see para 6 of)

despatch. It will be desirable to
substitute "Harmless alcohol for
purely commercial, and industrial,
medical, or scientific purposes"
for the word "to be known
as inferior Prohibition".
