

17th December.

Your telegram, 14th December. Maharaja Gwalior's Convalescent Hospital, East Africa Protectorate. Major G. E. Southon, I.M.S., in charge, and party sailed "Ellenga," from Bombay, 11th December, with everything necessary for starting a hospital. Location to be settled locally. There will be little delay in establishing arrangements once Southon arrives as he has taken everything necessary with him.

With reference to your letter of the 21st November last, regarding the control of British Forces operating in East Africa, I am directed to enquire whether Indian Expeditionary Forces "B" and "C" have now been amalgamated into one Force.

18th December, 1914.

I am commanded by the Army Council to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 1477, dated 18th December, 1914.

In reply, I am to state that the British Forces operating in British East Africa (formerly known as Forces "B" and "C") are now amalgamated into one Force, under the command of Brigadier-General R. Wapshott, C.B., D.S.O.

18th December, 1914, 4.35 p.m.

Receipt of telegram No. 17 is hereby acknowledged. Leak in main fuel tank has further developed off Rufiji and excessive priming of boiler is being experienced at slow speed with risk to main and auxiliary engine. Am remaining off Rufiji until arrival of "Kinshasa Castle," p.m., 19th December, but fear it will then be imperative to return to Mombasa, slow speed, to draw tanks and attempt further repairs to stop leak in tank.

It will now be necessary to place cement in slope of dock to reinforce bunkers immediately over main fuel tanks, as these bunkers are also leaking badly and into main fuel tank.

Repeated to Commander-in-Chief East Indies and Commander-in-Chief, Cape of Good Hope.

19th December, 1914, 12.55 p.m.

In support of British military advance against Umba timed for 19th December and 20th December, "Fox," with "Kinfauns Castle," "Satnara," and "Dupleix," transports, demonstrated on afternoon of 18th December off Tanga, anchoring at on roadsteads shortly before sunset.

Sweeping operations carried out late in afternoon and at sunset, "Fox" shelling cliffs southward of Ras Karon with a view to drawing fire of guns stated to have been mounted in vicinity, but without result.

Repeated to Commander-in-Chief, East Indies, and Commander-in-Chief, Cape.

19th December, 1914, 4.20 p.m.

I submit on "Weymouth" relieving "Chatham" very desirable to avoid dividing responsibility that Captain of the "Fox" should assume full duties Senior Naval Officer, East Africa, including charge of operations against "Königsberg."

Repeated to Senior Naval Officer, East Africa. "Fox."

Rifkindi, 21st December, 1914, 3.40 p.m.

S.s. "Ellenga" arrived with details on 26th.

21st December, 1914, 4.35 p.m.

General Tighe has reoccupied Vanga and established himself on the Umba River encountering only slight opposition. The rest of the frontier is quiet. I am awaiting in Mombasa a reply to my telegram No. 95-S.

*From H.M.S. "Chatham," Zanzibar, to Admiralty.*

(No. 1.)

21st December, 1914, 7.25 a.m.

"Chatham" arrived. Density of boiler water continued to increase off Rufiji - maximum 1.2 - and on afternoon of 19th inst. priming was so excessive steaming only at slow speed with all boilers alight, that feared stripped turbines. Asked "Fox" to relieve "Chatham" as soon as possible. "Fox" arrived 4.30 p.m. 20th inst., and "Chatham" left 5.0 p.m.

As soon as boiler water taken in will leave for Mombasa to carry out most urgent repair of main feed tank and reserve bunker over ditto.

"Fox" and "Kinfauns Castle" with armed tugs watching Rufiji.

Repeated to Commander-in-Chief, East Indies, and Commander-in-Chief, Cape.
