This has come into my hands just before oing on leave registration having been delayed owing to the previous papers being in circulation. Lord Passfield attached great importance to the issue of this report as a non-parliamentary publication here. as by that means it would come to the notice of members of Parliament and other people Interested. This arrangement was adopted for the 1929 and 1930 reports. and there has undoubtedly been a very great dday in publication in consequence, but we managed to reduce it in the case of the 1930 report. Prior to 1929 the report was printed locally and sent home in that form, the Colonial Office not having any opportunity of editing It. In the case of the 1929 and 1930 reports they came home in manuscript and were carefully examined in the Department. This necessarily occupied time in the case of such a long report which had to pass through several mands, and further time slapsed as the report is rather a formidable document to print, including elaborate tables and illustrations. I cannot see that there is any reason for printing the report here from the point of view of enabling the Colonial Office to edit it - it is not really our function - but I think there is a method of meeting the situation and yet maintaining Lord Passfield's view that it is desirable that it should be published as non-parliamentary report. This could be done on somewhat similar lines to the arrangement in the case of certain Colonial annual reports, that is to s the report should be printed locally and the requested number of sheets sent home here for the Stationary Office to bind in a cover as a non-parliamentary pap In that case, there seems no real reason why the Colonial

Sir S. Wilson:

I think that underlying Lord Passfield's decision there was also the idea that, if we received the Chief Native Commissioner's typsescript, it would be possible to ensure publication of any matters which he brought to light, even if/reflected on the administration. It is not so mucha matter of editing here as of possibly, "statting" the "7 matter which the Secretariat might wish to omit.

I do not think that this should weigh with us. Although the Joint Committee's recommendation as to the position of the Chief Native Commissioner has not yet been crystallised, it is well known, and there is no danger of its not being recognised.

There is the practical advantage of the present arrangement that we have early knowledge of matters which may provoke public eriticism. As a local publication copies will be sent home privately, and the critics will read the report as soon as we, do.

But the delays have been very great, and on that ground, and also to save a little money, I agree that we should proceed as in the draft.

Lord Passfield's despatch No. 246 of the 20th march 1930, on the subject of the printing in England of the Annual Report of the Native Affairs Department.

2. You will be aware from paragraph 3 of Sir Edward Grigg's despatch No. 580 of the 8th September 1930, that he asked for a little more working experience of this procedure before finally taking a decision thereon. Experience new shows that the fear of considerable delay in publication of these reports has been realised. The 1929 Report was despatched on 8th September 1930 and eventually was published here on the 26th February 1931. The 1930 Report was despatched on 21st August 1931 and was published on 8th January 1932. Had the 1930 Report been sent to print at the Government Press, Nadrobi, by the middle of August, it would have been printed and available for circulation / early in September, and considerable delay would have been avoided. This delay gives rise, unfor tunately, to the criticism that the Report on publication is so out of date that much of the interest which it might have contained is lost. Such a criticism is, I feel, both just and also somewhat disheartening to the whief Native Commissioner.
