





(c) As regards the proposal to engage an Inspector for a tour, the Estimates in 18336/32 Kenya, provide for a Chief Inspector at £840-920 and two Inspectors at £480-600. These Estimates were approved on the understanding that no such commitment is entered into with any individual officer as would preclude review of the organisation for subsequent years, but this stipulation can hardly be held to apply to the engagement of an officer on agreement for one tour only.

It is not stated whether the present appointment relates to a Chief Inspector or to an Inspector, but it is unlikely that a qualified man with experience could be secured at the initial salary of £480 and it seems important that a good man should be obtained, The Governor evidently considers that a candidate could be obtained more quickly from Rhodesia or South Africa.

So far as the Department is concerned there seems no objection to these proposals, but the matter is mainly one for the C.S.D.

?Subject to any comments by C.S.D. (and by D.O. as regards direct correspondence with South Africa) inform the Governor by telegram that the proposals in 4 are approved, but add that it is assumed that the Inspector will be engaged on the scale £480-£600.
