With reference to your letter of the 3rd February on the subject of the prohibition of the use of metal game traps in Kenya, I am directed by the Beard of Trade to state that they are informed by the Colonial Office that with a view to restricting the practice of trapping game on account of the cruelty involved an ordinance has recently been enacted by the Government of Kenya, Section 4 (2) of which prohibits the use in the Colony, except on private ground or with special permission, of any form of trap or energy capable of catching any protected animal. A copy of the relevant section of the Ordinance is enclosed.

Copies of the Schedules to the Principal Ordinances referred to are also enclosed.

Prohibition of sale of traps, gins or spares. 4. (1) No person shall sell or barter or attempt to sell or barter any trap, gin, or snare which is capable of catching any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules to the Frincipal ordinance without the permission in writing of the game warden.

Any person found in possession of any such trap, gin, or snare in such circumstances as to make it appear that such person is selling or bartering or about to sell or barter any such trap, gin, or enare, shall be liable to be arrested by any magistrate, justice of the peace, police officer, tribal police officer, game warden, or commissioned or non-commissioned officer of the King's African Rifles, and thereafter to be proceeded against and punished for cammitting a breach of the Frincipal Ordinance, unless such person can produce a permit in writing from the game warden permitting such person to sell or barter any such trap, gin, or snare.

(2) So person shall set, elsewhere than on private land, any trap, gin, or snare which is capable of catching any snisal mentioned in any of the Schedules to the Frincipal Ordinance, without the permission in writing of the game warden.

Any person found in possession of any such trap, gin or snare in such direcumstances as make it appear that such trap, gin, or snare has been or is about to be set on land other than private land shall be liable to be arrested by any magistrate, justice of the peace, police officer, tribal police officer, game warden, or commissioned or non-commissioned officer of the King's african Rifles, and thereafter to be proceeded against and punished for committing a breach of the Frincipal Ordinance, unless such person can produce a permit in writing from the game warden permitting such person to set any such trap, gih, or snare;

Provided that where, in the opinion of a district officer a case of urgoncy or emergency exists, such district efficer shall have power to sign and issue a permit under this sub-section on behalf of the game warden, and in every such case a copy of such permit shall be sent to the game warden as soon as possible.

(5) Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this section for which no penalty is provided shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six menths, and any trap, gin, or snare in respect of which any offence under this section may be committed shall be confiscated.

LEGAL REPORT.

THE GAME (AMENDMENT) BILL, 1932.

This Bill amends the Game Ordinance (Chapter 161 of the Revised Edition) in the following respects:-

Clause 2 of the Bill extends the privileges of a serving officer's licence to members of the indian Public Service.

clause 3 of the Bill adds leopards to the categories of animals which may be killed on or adjacent the private land; removes exception by which hunting was allowed within five miles of any railway; and makes it clear that it is not permitted to set traps, gins, or snares on land, other than private land.

Clause 4 (1) of the Bill provides that no person shall sell or barter any trap, gin, or snare which is capable of catching any protected animal without the permission of the Game Warden, and Clause 4 (2) provides that no person shall set, elsewhere than on private land, any trap, gin, or snare which is capable of catching any protected animal without the permission of the Game Warden and the necessary powers of arrest in case of any person found in possession of any trap, gin, or snare in such circumstances as make it appear that such trap, gin, or snare has been or is about to be set on land other than private land. In case of emergency a District Officer shall have power to sign and issue permit on behalf of the Game Warden. A

thus making it a protected animal Principal Ordinance/will be issued by the Governor in Council as soon as the Ordinance has been assented to.

The reason for Clause 4 of the Bill is that trapping of leopards is being carried on on such a large scale as to upset the balance of nature. In addition, trapping is a very cruel method of killing, and Clause 4 imposes restrictions on this practice.

Under Section 35A of the Principal Ordinance it is prohibited to hunt, kill or capture game during the hours of darkness but that prohibition does not apply to the hunting, killing or capturing of any lion or cheetah within 25 miles of any private land. To these categories of animals leopard has been added by Clause 5 of the Bill.

In my opinion, His Excellency the Governor may properly assent to this Bill in the name and on behalf of His Majesty.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE GAME ORDINANCE

No. XLIX of 1982

An Ordinance to Amend the Game Ordinance.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya. with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :-

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as " the Game (Amend- Short title. ment) Ordinance, 1932 ", and shall be read as one with the Game Ordinance (Chapter 161 of the Revised Edition), as amended by the Game (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928, herein No. 25 of 1928. together referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."
- 2. Sub-section (9) of section 17 of the Principal Amendment of Ordinance, as amended by the Game (Amendment) Ordinance, section 17 (9) 1928, is hereby amended by inserting after the word Principal "Forces" the words "or in the Public Service of His Ordinance Majesty in India.

3. Section 36 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended by inserting the word 'leopard' after the word the Principal "hon" in the third line of the section, and by deleting the Ordinance. words " or within five miles of any railway " which appear in the tenth and eleventh lines thereof and by inserting after sub-section (c) thereof the following proviso:-

- " Provided that nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to permit the setting on land other than private land of traps, gins, or snares capable of catching any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules to the Principal Ordinance.
- 4. (1) No person shall sell or barter or attempt to sell Prohibition of or barser any trap, gin, or snare which is capable of catching sale of traps, any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules to the Principal snares. Ordinance without the permission in writing of the game warden.

Any person found in possession of any such trap, gin, or snare in such circumstances as to make it appear that such person is selling or bartering or about to sell or barter

any such trap, gin, or snare, shall be liable to be arrested by any magistrate, justice of the peace, police officer, tribal police officer, game warden, or commissioned or non-commissioned officer of the King's African Rifles, and thereafter to be proceeded against and punished for committing a breach of the Frincipal Ordinance, unless such person can produce a permit in writing from the game warden permitting such person to sell or barter any such trap, gin, or snare.

(2) No person shall set, elsewhere than on private land, any trap, gin, or snare which is capable of catching any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules to the Principal Ordinance, without the permission in writing of the game warden.

Any person found in possession of any such trap, gin, or snare in such circumstances as make it appear that such trap, gin, or snare has been or is about to be set on land other than private land shall be liable to be arrested by any magistrate, justice of the peace, police officer, tribal police officer, game warden, or commissioned or non-commissioned officer of the King's African Rifles, and thereafter to be proceeded against and punished for committing a breach of the Principal Ordinance, unless such person can produce a permit in writing from the game warden permitting such person to set any such trap, gin, or snare:

Provided that where, in the opinion of a district officer a case of urgency or emergency exists, such district officer shall have power to sign and issue a permit under this sub-section on behalf of the game warden, and in every such case a copy of such permit shall be sent to the game warden as soon as possible.

(5) Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this section for which no penalty is provided shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one lundred pounds or to imprisonment for a term not speeding six months, and any trap, gin, or smare in respect of which any offence under this section may be committed shall be conficulted.

A Bill to Amend the Game Ordinance.

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Game (Amend-Short title. ment) Ordinance, 1932". and shall be read as one with the Game Ordinance (Chapter 161 of the Revised Edition), as amended by the Game (Amendment) Ordinance, 1928, herein No. 25 of 1928, together referred to as "the Principal Ordinance."
- 2. Sub-section (9) of section 17 of the Principal section 17 (9) Ordinance, as amended by the Game (Amendment) Ordinance, of the 1928, is hereby amended by inserting after the word Principal ordinance.

- 8. Section 18 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended by deleting the words " or to an officer in the public the Principal service of the Uganda Protectorate or Tanganyika Territory " Ordinance and substituting therefor the words " or to a resident in the Uganda Protectorate, Tanganyika Territory or the Sudan."
- 4. Section 36 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby Amendment of amended by inserting the word "leopard" after the word section 36 of the Principal Ordinance.

Prohibition of use of metal traps.

- 5. (1) No person shall possess, sell or use any kind of metal trap which is designed to hunt, kill or capture any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules to the Principal Ordinance.
- (2) Any person who contravenes the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a section shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a fine of one hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, and any trap in respect of which the offence was committed shall be forfeited unless the Governor shall otherwise order.
- (3) Nothing in section 35 or section 36 of the Principal Ordinance shall be deemed to render lawful the use of a metal trap for the purpose of hunting, killing or capturing any animal.

OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill has two separate and distinct purposes. Clausee 2 and 3 extend the privilege of a serving officer's licence to members of the Indian Public Service, and the privilege of a resident's licence to residents of Uganda, Tanganyika Territory and the Sudan instead of only to members of the Public Service.

Clause 5 prohibits the possession, sale or use of metal traps designed to capture or kill game.

Clause 4 adds leopards to the categories of animals which may be killed on or adjacent to private land.

It is not anticipated that there will be any loss of revenue in consequence of the provisions of Clauses 2 and 3: on the contrary increased revenue may result.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this B'll become law.
