ORDINANCE No. XXIV of 1933

**An Ordinance to Amend the Customs Tariff
Ordinance, 1930.**

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Customs Tariff ~~short title~~ (Amendment) Ordinance, 1933," and shall be read as one with the Customs Tariff Ordinance, 1930, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Ordinance".

2. The Schedule to the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the deletion of items 14, 37, 38, 40, 49 (e), 49 (f), 59, 66 (a), 72, 104, 118, and by the addition in their respective numerical positions of the following:—



ASSESSMENT OF DUTY ON GOODS
IMPORTED BY AIR.

NOTICE.

IT is hereby notified in accordance with sections 3/4 of the Kenya Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, dated 30-12-82, and until further notice one-fourth of—

- (a) air freight charges for goods carried as cargo;
- (b) air postage charges for goods carried as post parcels.

will be taken for the purpose of assessing duty in the manner established by section 4 of the Customs Tariff Ordinance, 1980, subject to the proviso that in the case of (b) the amount of postal charges for duty assessment must not be reduced below Sh. 2/-.

2. This procedure will operate with retrospective effect as from 30-6-82 inclusive and any necessary adjustment in respect of past importations may be arranged on application to the Commissioner of Customs, Kenya and Uganda, Custom House, Mombasa.

THE CUSTOMS TARIFF (AMENDMENT) BILL,

In order to permit of accession to the Anglo-Greek Commercial Treaty, 1926, which secures most favoured nation treatment to goods originating in territories adhering to the Treaty and imported into Greece, it is necessary to impose a rate of duty not exceeding Sh.2/- per cwt. on currants imported from Greece, and section 2 of this Bill achieves this object. As differential treatment in the matter of countries of origin is not permissible under the terms of the Congo Basin Treaties, the same rate of duty must be charged on all imported currants, irrespective of the country of origin.

2. The reason for the enactment of section 3 of this Bill is that, when the Customs Tariff Ordinance, 1930, was enacted, the conveyance of dutiable goods in any quantity by air was not contemplated. Representations have been made to the effect that the very considerable freight charges by this route, on which duty is now paid, do not correspondingly increase the intrinsic value of the goods in question, nor is such a charge taken into consideration in the case of goods on which duty is calculated at a specific rate.

ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Customs Tariff (Amendment) Ordinance, 1932," and shall be read as one with the Customs Tariff Ordinance, 1930, hereinafter called "the Principal Ordinance." Short title.
No. I of 1930.

2. (1) Class I of the Schedule to the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the deletion of item 12 (b), occurring therein, and the substitution of the following in lieu thereof:—

12 (b) Currants, dried, without sugar	per 100 lb.	Sh. cts. 1 75

(2) This section shall come into operation on such day as the Governor may by notice in the Gazette appoint.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in section 4 of the Principal Ordinance, the Commissioner shall be empowered, in respect of goods conveyed by air, to reduce the amount of the freight charges to be added to the value for purposes of assessment of duty to a figure not less than one-fourth of the freight charges actually payable on such goods.

4. Section 3 of this Ordinance shall be deemed to have come into operation on the 30th day of June, 1932, and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to pay out of the general revenue of the Colony such sums as may be found to be payable by way of refunds owing to the retrospective effect of section 3 of this Ordinance.
