As these are the first of the series of statistics to be sent in, naturally nothing can be concluded from them, as all conclusions will be the result of comparisons. The forms accordingly are to be considered as to their suitability and adequacy.

[I think] The Governments concerned are to be congratulated on the amount of information contained in the two forms they propose using, which show a great deal of detail, and, being drawn up on the spot, very likely represent the best that can be done at this time. Even without alteration, they will <sup>go far</sup> help to form a good idea of the progress or decline of the fishery, though without an attempt at stating the fishing effort the conclusions would not be clear. Some remarks, however, seem called for.

Table A.

1) The average weight of Kgege is to be given. To be reliable, a stated number of fish, say 100, should be weighed in the same month every year. This weighing need not be necessarily on the same day, but should be at approximately the same date and may spread over a week without disadvantage - as long as the fish are not selected in any way. The total weight of the fish weighed and their number would be a sufficient entry.

2) It would be a great advantage if these weights were entered also for some of the <sup>fish</sup> chief fish - e.g. Singa and Mamba.

3) The week during which the number of fish per net is computed should be as nearly as possible the same year by year.

4) Neither Table A nor Table B furnish any information as to the number of nets or their distribution in the various districts. <sup>It is suggested</sup> I suggest that a description of the nets used (giving dimensions) should be made out; each year the description should be amended. Another Table should state the number of nets, distinguishing districts. This information is provided in the Returns accompanying the skeleton forms (Tables 1-5, Uganda), so is presumably ascertainable.

5) [I think] A column should be added for fish other than those named specifically. The heading "Others" would do, as presumably the entries would be individually unimportant.

Table B.

1) This applies only to dried fish. <sup>It is suggested</sup> I should hope that extra columns or similar forms will be used for fresh fish. Even if it is impracticable to furnish weights for the fresh fish sold locally, it should be possible to get the weights of fish sent by rail or exported. Fish refrigeration is growing very rapidly, and simple processes are now available. Similarly, canned and salted fish are possible additions in the future. They are presumably unimportant at present.

2) The accompanying forms show destination of the fish sent by rail (see particularly Tables B (1) and (11) from Kisumu). From the fishery point of view, detailed destination does not seem of importance <sup>it is suggested</sup> but I should have anticipated that the Government would have <sup>found</sup> it convenient to have the exports to various Colonies and countries distinguished, and, if this is done for local administrative purposes, it would be an advantage if the information reached London also.

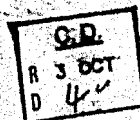

MEMORANDUM.

The Governments concerned are to be congratulated on the amount of information contained in the two forms they propose using, which show a great deal of detail. They will go far to form a good idea of the progress or decline of the fishery, though without an attempt at stating the fishing effort the conclusions would not be clear. Some remarks, however, seem called for.

Table A.

1) The average weight of Egege is to be given. To be reliable, a stated number of fish, say 100, should be weighed in the same month every year. This weighing need not be necessarily on the same day, but should be at approximately the same date and may spread over a week without disadvantage - as long as the fish are not selected in any way. The total weight of the fish weighed and their number would be a sufficient entry.

2) It would be a great advantage if these weights were entered also for some of the other chief fish - e.g. Hingu and Mende.

3) The week during which the number of fish per net is computed should be as nearly as possible the same year by year.

4) Neither Table A nor Table B furnish any information as to the number of nets or their distribution in the various districts. It is suggested that a description of the nets used (giving dimensions) should be made out; each year the description should be amended. Another Table should state the number of nets, distinguishing districts. This information is provided

I have the honour to refer to your letter 17226/31 of the 3rd June, 1933, on the subject of the collection of statistics in regard to the fisheries on Lake Victoria, and to state that the Governments of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory were asked in March, 1932, to forward statistical records on the lines indicated in your letter 17226/31 of the 15th February, 1932, to me annually as soon as possible after the 1st January, 1933, so that they might be embodied in a composite record for distribution to the various Governments concerned.

2. During the earlier months of this year statistics were received from these three Governments but it was found that the returns were not prepared on the same basis and could not accordingly be embodied in one return. I accordingly discussed the question with representatives of the three Governments and with Captain Ritchie, Game Warden, Kenya, and Mr. Dent of the Game Department, Kenya, who was associated with Mr. Michael Graham during the time of his fishing survey on Lake Victoria in 1927 and 1928, and as a result drew up skeleton schedules which I am informed will give statistics of use to a future fishing control organisation; these schedules distinguish between the following species, *Tilapia esculenta*, *Labeo victorianus*, and *Schilbe mystus*, and also give the average weight of *Tilapia esculenta*, the/

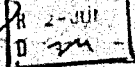
