different. But the conclusion to be
derived from No. 2 is incontestable; viz.
that in five years the Kenya Govt. has
reduced that part of its expenditure which
it is in a position to control by
£594,178, or nearly 25%.

I annex a statement which is intended to show the trend of Kenya expenditure, reducible and irreducible, since 1929. It is impossible to give an exact figure of irreducible expenditure since we have no information as regards the net results of certain cross entries and re-imbursements, but figures taken from the Colonial Estimates have been used in these cases, e.g.
