Sir,

Kenya & Uganda Railways and Harbour Administration - Status and conditions of service of Sanitary Inspectors.

Representation has been received from members of my Association upon the unsatisfactory conditions of service and status of Sanitary Inspectors employed under the Kenya and Uganda Railways.

The facts as reported to my Association are briefly as follows:-

Two Sanitary Inspectors are affected, viz: Mr. A. C. Campbell and Mr. D. A. Dick. Mr. Campbell was appointed as Sanitary Inspector to the Kenya Medical Department in February 1929, and transferred in December 1930 to the Railway Administration of Kenya. Mr. Dick was appointed Sanitary Inspector to the Medical Branch of the Railway in October 1929. Both are fully qualified Sanitary Inspectors, and have had practical experience in the discharge of those duties. In addition, Mr. Dick has attended a short course in Medical Entomology at the Medical Research Laboratory, Nairobi. On the latter's arrival at Nairobi he was informed by the Railway Medical Officer that as there was a high incidence of malaria among the railway employees, general insanitary conditions at railway stations, and complaints from the travelling public, the Railway Advisory Council had decided to appoint qualified Sanitary Inspectors, and that he was to carry out the recognised duties of a Sanitary Inspector on the railway.

At the end of 1931, the Railway Medical Officer was transferred to the Medical Department, Kenya, and the Inspectors were transferred to the Engineering Department with headquarters at Nairobi, but for the purposes of discipline they were attached to the staffs of the District Engineer, (See Chief Enganeer's Circulars Nos. 1 & 1(A) of 1932, sent herewith)

This arrangement has proved very unsatisfactory, and the Sanitary Inspectors have experienced the greatest difficulty in carrying out their statutory duties as is evidenced by the following example: On one occasion an Inspector was reprimanded for stopping an Assistant Station from handling foodstuffs, and issuing tickets and ringworm from handling foodstuffs, and issuing tickets to the travelling public, and told he was exceeding his duties as Sanitary subsequent occasions as is shown by correspondence on possession of my Association. The exercise by the Sanitary is being constantly challenged by the Engineers, and they are duties.

It is submitted that the Engineering Department is not an appropriate one to direct and control the work of Sanitary Inspectors for the following reasons:-

- Engineers have little or no knowledge of the duties of Sanitary Inspectors or of matters relating to sanitation and public health.
- (2) Frequently the Engineering Department are the chief offenders under the Public Health enactments, and this being so, they are inclined to pay little attention to matters complained of by the Inspectors. Instances are on record where the Sanitary Inspector is entirely ignored.
- (3) is the Railway Administration do not possess the statutory powers of a Local Authority under the Public Health Ordenauco they are unable to proceed against offenders, and as the Municipality exercise no jurisdiction over the Government Railways an anomally would appear to arise calling for
- (4) Ingineers are not in a position to afford expert advice on matters affecting public health such as could be obtained from the Medical Officer of Health.

I should also mention, with regard to salaries, that whilst the Railway Sanitary Inspectors are appointed by the Government at a similar salary to that of other Government Inspectors, their poets are not pensionable, but they are required to contribute to a Provident Scheme less advantageous. Further, no facilities are available for promotion such as other Government Inspectors have.

My Association are informed that the case has been fully represented to the Medical Department of Kenya but no improvement in the conditions has yet been effected. It is respectfully suggested that a possible solution of the difficulty would be for the Railway Sanitary Inspectors to be attached to the Medical Department of Kenya, as is the case with other Government Sanitary Inspectors.

I am to eak that you will be good enough to give these matters your serious consideration. I shall be glad if an opportunity could

be afforded me to further discuss the subject with representatives of the Department at an early date.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S GENERAL CIRCULAR NO. 1. OF 1932.

DUTIES OF SANITARY INSPECTORS.

The District Engineer is the Supervising Officer of Railway Senitation within his District, except at wayside stations when the sanitation is dealt with by the Transportation Department.

A Senitary Inspector is attached to each instrict in Kenya with headquarters at Kilindini, Nairobi and Elderet, respectively.

The Sanitary Inspector shall report to and take his instructions from the Sistrict Engineer.

The Sanitary Inspector will submit a fortnightly report, in duplicate, to the District Engineer, who will forward one copy of same to the Chief Engineer.

Sanitary Inspectors are expected to deal with minor repairs and improvements to drains, cesspits, and all other works which can be undertaken by unskilled labour.

Sanitary Inspectors are required to carry out periodical inspections of quarters in the terms of Hon: General Manager: Circular No. 1 of 1927. Excerpts from the Circular in question are given below for ready reference:-

"(10) All occupants of Railway Quarters are "responsible for the cleanliness and tidiness "of their houses and the compounds attached "to their houses."

*(11) An Inspector appointed by the whief
*Engineer for this purpose has the right to
fenter any compound or house which he may deem
untidy and clean it up. The actual cost of
*doing this (which shall not exceed Sd.8/-)
*chall be recovered from the occupant of the
house.

"(lis). The Inspector must take care to give as "little inconvenience to occupiers as the proper execution of his duty will permit, and particular care shall be taken in dealing with Indian houses not to violate the rules of purdah or bona fide "religious principles."

The Sanitary and Bush Clearing gangs at his Headquarters stations are under the direct supervision of the Sanitary Inspector, who will maintain the muster rolls and submit them to the District Engineer.

MOTT: The Landi Overseers, at Nairobi and Lisumu, will not come under the jurisdiction of the Sanitary inspector, but will be advised by the Sanitary inspector when necessary in sanitary matters.

At all other Depot Stations the muster rolls are maintained by the Permanent Way Inspector - e.g. Makindu, etc.

At wayside stations the senitary labour is under the orders of the Station Master, who is responsible for the cleanliness of his Station latrines and platform, and the yerd and station area is kept clean by the Permanent Way gangs.

The Sanitary Inspector will be Adviser to the Station Raster and Permanent Way Inspector of each station resanitary matters.

Engineering Senitary labour has no duties in connection with rolling stock other than the placing of buckets under Inspection Goaches, stabled at Depot Stations.

Officers of the Medical Department may not issue orders to the Railway Sanitary Inspector but must deal direct with the District Engineer in regard to the abatement of any nuisance etc., unless the matter is very urgent, and any orders given must be submitted to the District Engineer for information.

NOTE: Sanitary Inspectors, Nairobi and Eldoret will continue to be in charge of the fumigation of Coaches until the Transportation Department is in a position to take over this work.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S GENERAL CIRCULAR NO. IA. OF 1932.

Pares 2, 3 and 4 of General Circular No. 1. of 1932 are cancelled, and the following paragraphs substituted:

- Two Senitary Inspectors are attached to the Department, with headquarters at Nairobi and Eldoret.
- 5. These Sanitary Inspectors will be responsible for the sanitation on railway property on the C.E.D. & N.E.D. and L.E.D. & U.E.D. respectively, but for purposes of discipline will be attached to the staffs of the District Engineer, Nairobi Engineering District, and District Engineer, Lake Engineering District.
- 4. They will submit fortnightly reports in duplicate to all of the District Engineers concerned, who will forward one copy of same to the Chief Engineer.
