Seeks sanction of payment of a gratuity to the dependents of Jacob Adas on the grounds that his death was accelerated by his work; enquires whether authority can be given for payment of compensation to dependents of native constable who die from diseases contracted or duty.

Section 900 of the Civil Regulations says "An Officer or a Clerk or the non-commissioned Staff may:-

(a)

(a) if he has served for not less than 15 years and his retirement is caused from infirmity or ruin or loss, permanently incapacitating him from the duties of his employment

be granted a gratuity not exceeding £1, or one week's pay (whichever is the greater), for each completed year of service, subject to the limit of one year's pay, including house allowance, of eight shillings.

Had the deceased officer retired on the 26 Dec 1930, he would have been eligible for a gratuity of £1.

? Payment to the widow may be approved.

in C. 22381/1926 Genl. in which he
refers to a Treasury letter of 7th
August, 1919, in which it is stated
that the Govt. do not regard
the wording of the Warrant of 17th
Jan. 1919 (under Sec. 1 of the Superannua-
tion Act, 1887), as excluding from
the benefits of the Warrant the
widow or of man who succumb to
disease. The C. practice
regarding disease is set out in 22381/26
Genl.

In view of x - I think it might
be held that the Treasury have
accepted the principle of including
disease in the interpretation of
injury in cases of compensation
to dependents, and that the
authority given in 29444/29/11
might, following the
decision on 22381/26 Genl., very
well be extended to disease.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that an application has been received for the grant of a compassionate gratuity to the widow of a native, Jacobo Adoyo, s/o Abongo, who worked in various capacities at the Health Office, Kisumu, since the 1st October, 1915, from which date until his death from acute pneumonia, on the 26th of February, 1934, he gave the greatest satisfaction to his senior officers, carrying out his duties in a highly efficient, zealous and loyal manner.

2. This deceased officer left a widow and three young children entirely destitute, and in view of the fact that his duties brought him into constant contact with the swamps surrounding Kisumu the Director of Medical Services and the Treasurer have recommended that a gratuity of £18 equivalent to the amount which would have been due to him under Section 900 of the Code of Regulations had he retired for medical reasons on the 26th of February, 1934, should be granted to his widow, on the ground that his death was accelerated by the nature of his work. I am in agreement with this recommendation, and shall be glad if your sanction

3. In this connection I would invite your attention to Lord Passfield's despatch No.839 of the 23rd of October, 1929, wherein it was agreed that compensation to dependents of native Government employees who die as a result of accidents should be paid on the Governor's authority up to a limit of £20, and would enquire whether you would be prepared to extend this authority to cover cases of deaths from natural causes, where there is clear evidence that the disease was contracted in the actual discharge of duty and was specifically attributable to the nature of the duty.
