

I am, etc. to request to inform the Board of Customs and Excise that the Governor of Kenya has asked that they may be approached with a view to the secondment of a suitable officer to the Kenya and Uganda Customs Department as a Collector of Customs.
2. The Governor states that the officer should not be less than 25 years of age. He should be unmarried, and should have sufficient independence of character to ensure that he will be able to control a numerous staff of subordinate officers. It is also of importance that the appointee should have good manners and some aptitude for games.
