My Lord,

I have the honour to transmit a petition addressed to Your Lordship by Mr. B.F. Soares, 1st Grade Clerk, Public Works Department, in which he asks that his Railway service from the 1st January, 1900, to the 31st December, 1908, should be regarded as pensionable. In this connection it should be noted that the 15th January, 1900, is the date of the commencement of Mr. Soares' service with the Railway Administration.

2. From the records at my disposal, it is evident that Mr. Soares himself gave notice of his desire to resign from the service of the Uganda Railway in order to improve his prospects. He joined the Public Works Department on the 1st January, 1909, and on leaving the Railway was duly paid a bonus of 50% of his salary in respect of his services in that Department and as a further privilege was allowed the special concession of counting his Railway service for leave-taking purposes.

*4/10/31 has been paid to Soares of 100/- bonus for leaving*

3. Mr. Soares is one of the eight clerks referred to in paragraph 4 of Mr. Charles Bowring's despatch No. 776 of the 6th December, 1916. At the time of his resignation Mr. Soares was drawing a salary of Rs. 100/- per annum while he was engaged in the Public Works Department at a salary of Rs. 120/- per annum.

4. I am unable to corroborate the statement in paragraph 2 of the petition that his application for

his previous Railway service to count for pension has only recently been refused, as perusal of his personal file shows that Mr. Soares first raised this question in July 1919, when he was informed that his request could not be granted. Again in 1923 in submitting an application for a special allowance the following appears in Mr. Soares own handwriting:-

"Last 9 years' Railway service with  
correspondence".

and 9. Messrs. S. Pereira and Sant Singh referred to in the petition were cases of actual transfer and were accorded special treatment as will be seen from the late Mr. Kumar Law's despatch No. 400 of the 6th July, 1916, and Mr. Amery's despatch No. 49 of the 6th January, 1920.

I consider that this case is one which should be dealt with strictly in accordance with the rulings laid down in the latter despatch and I see no justification for recommending the petition for Your Lordship's favourable consideration. As will be seen from Mr. Charles Bowring's despatch above referred to there are other cases similar to that of the petitioner

My Lord,

I beg most humbly and respectfully to put my case in brief before your Lordship for your sympathetic consideration for which act of kindness I shall be always ~~thankful~~.

1. On 1st. of January 1900 I joined the Kenya and Uganda Railway as a clerk and worked in the same Administration until 31st. December 1908. On the 1st. of January 1909 my services were taken over by the Public Works Department as they were urgently in need of a competent clerk in charge of this Department being the subject of correspondence between the Hon. Director of Public Works and the Resident Superintendent of Kenya and Uganda Railway and my Railway service was treated as a ~~transfer~~ and my privileges were to lapse.

2. When my services were taken over by the Public Works Department I was under the impression that my previous service with the Railway would be counted towards all the Government provisions as both these are Department Departments, but to my surprise the Hon. Treasurer states now when I am nearly due for retirement, that it cannot be counted for pension purposes on the grounds that I received a bonus under the Old Railway Scheme.

The only benefit (if it can be so termed) which I have received so far as I know, has been 5% added to my salary in common with all Railway employees under the old scheme. As far as I am aware no deductions were made from my salary and I drew no bonus as the scheme of Railway Provident Fund was not at that period in force and I am not quite sure whether the 5% addition to my salary mentioned above was intended as a bonus.

(3). I understand that the services of some of the Railway officials in similar circumstances as myself, on their transfer to the Colony's Administration, have been allowed to count for pension purposes, particularly the case of Messrs. B. Pereira of the Audit Department and Surt Singh of the Medical Department.

(4). If I was aware that my nine years' service would be lost to me I would not have taken up the post offered to me by the Public Works Department as I consider that under the present Railway scheme (which came in force on the day I joined the Public Works Department) my financial position would now have been far better. I admit that it was my mistake for not ascertaining the facts beforehand which was due to my ignorance and therefore I pray that your Lordship will not turn down my case on that account.

(5). In view of the above explanation and facts I again most humbly and respectfully appeal to your Lordship to give my case your sympathetic consideration and accord your approval for my nine years services to be counted towards pension otherwise a loss of this would be a hardship to me.
