> It is proposed to deviate from the recommendation of the Land Commission in the following respects: -

- (a) To fix a line by means of existing natural features to divide the class Bl area recommended in paragraph 542 from the class C (or "Mative Leasehold area recommended in puragraph 1879(1) of the report. This would involve a slight adjustment of the dividing line proposed by the Commission but would not after the dimensions of either area.
- (b) To reduce the area recommended by the (Para 542) Commission for addition to the Kikuvu Vative Reserve on economic grounds, by a small strip along the right bank of the Tana River at the site of the proposed Seven Forks hydro-electric scheme. It will be remembered that a party of experts are at present investigating the commercial possibilities of the Seven Forks scheme as compared with those of the

Maragwa-Tana scheme. (See 23108/24/34).

Both proposals seem reasonable. As regards (b) it will be seen from paragraph 542 of the report that the Commissioners thought that an addition of 350 to 400 square miles was warranted and actually recommended an addition of 383 square miles. According to the plan accompanying the despatch the effect of the present proposal will be to reduce the area to 378 square miles. It is far better to leave the Seven Forks site clear and thus avoid the complications which arise if the site were in a native

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blue from the bearing

The proposals are quite clear and can be easily followed from the map. The difference between B 1 and C land is that B 1 is land which is highlestone required permanently to allow the tribe to develop while in C land special facilities are recommended for natives, but the normal method of tenure is intended to be by lease. adjustment of the boundary between B 1 and C additions to the Kikuyu Reserve will make very little difference to either area. Part of what is now shewn as C land will become Boand part of what is shewn as B land will become C. I do not imagine that in practice there will be very much difference so the boundary adjustment can obviously be approved. It makes no difference to the amount of land available for natives.

The exclusion of the 5 square miles round the "Seven Forks" area on the Tana River is another matter. Higher up the river at the junction of it and the River Maragwa a development scheme for electric power has been held up because the native population are unwilling to agree to a certain amount of flooding of their land and suitable alternative land cannot be found. If the "jeven Forks" area becomes native reserve there might be a similar difficulty hereafter. It is therefore proposed to exclude from the land to be added to the Reserve as B 1 land a sufficient area to allow of another possible development in the hydro-electric power line. This, too, is clearly desirable. There is nothing unusual or improper in Govt. keeping control over all possible sources of power and I

think

think that all shades of political opinion in this country would agree with that policy. It is, however, as Mr. Freeston puts it, a matter for consideration whether some addition should not be made to the Native Reserve to compensate for this area of 3,200 acres and the map shows that it ought to be fairly easy to add a similar amount from the piece coloured blue on the map. Indeed, if it were left to me I would go further and add the whole of the blue area to the B class land as compensation. This would mean taking away 5 square miles from the area and adding 33, a nett gain of 28 square miles. The blue land area, in accordance with paragraph 542 of the Commission's Report, is recommended to be D land wherein both natives and Europeans will have equal rights. It is noteworthy, however, that the Chairman would have preferred to make it part of the extension to the Kikuyu with a proviso that it is to be an area in which non-natives should be encouraged to take up land. This recommendation of the Chairman's does not make very good sense and I think in the long run it would probably be best to lump the whole area into the Kikuyu block and class it not as D land but as B. However, it should be enough to suggest to the Governor the addition of a suitable quantity of land to the B area from this block.

In anything of this nature the question of access to water is sure to be raised by somebody or other. However, the construction

of hydro-electric works in the "Seven Forks" area should not do very much to interfere with the water rights of the adjoining population. I do not suppose that there will be any attempt at excluding natives from getting at the river across the excised strip though, of course, it will be necessary in order to safeguard the future that native settlement in the Seven Forks piece should not be encouraged in any way.

On detailed examination of the proposals it appeared to my advisers to be preferable instead of adopting the straight line boundary separating the sl from the C areas, as recommended by the Commission, to fix a line by means of prominent natural features which would be easily discernible on the ground. Such features exist in the httls om which the trigonometries beacons named "Thatha" and "Mdalai" are erected, and a line connecting these two points would leave the respective total areas of the BI and C blocks practically as before.
- 3. The other matter has reference to the future development of the hydro-electric power reserves of the Golony on which expert investigation is now proceeding. The power reaches known as "the Seven Forks" fall within the area classified by the Commission as BI

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mative reserve. It appears to be possible that this water power may eventually be required for the generation of electric energy and my advisers recommend that, in order to avoid possible complications, a sufficient area around the falls to satisfy the requirements of a Power Scheme be excluded before the formal addition to the native reserve is made. The precise area which may be required cannot be decided upon until the report of the present technical investigation has been received and considered, but the exclusion will be restricted to the needs of the Scheme.

4. Both these proposals as illustrated on the enclosed plan are recommended by the Provincial commissioner (Central Province) the commissioner for Local Covernment, Lands and Settlement, and the Acting Chief Native Commissioner, and will, I trust, receive your approval.
