In paragraph 2 of the latter despatch I informed you that I proposed to afford Mr. Pazan an opportunity of prowing his worth by appointing him in charge of the Nyanza Province with a view to giving further consideration to his claims for promotion on the occurrence of a vacancy. I am now glad to report that Mr. Fazan has done very well in charge of this Province and that, with the increased responsibility, there has been a great lam rovement in his work and general attitude. promotion.

4. The two remaining officers, Mr.Izard and Mr.Tomkinson, are both regarded as suitable for promotion. Mr.Izard is the senior by four months. During recent

recent years Mr.Izard has been stationed in settled areas and has had no experience of administering a large Native Reserve. He has now, however, been appointed as District Commissioner, Central Kawirondo, and, if he does well there, cannot I consider be passed over for promotion. In the circumstances, therefore, I propose to defer submitting a recommendation for filling the vacant post of Senior District Commissioner for six months until Mr.Izard has proved his ability in this branch of administration.
