This foreshadows a good deal of nuisance. The A.S.P.A.P. Society was bad enough but a special committee dealing with Africa will have to justify its existence and will be a distinct menace to good government.

It is obvious that answers to their questions cannot be given straight off.

The proposed separation of the Agricultural and Veterinary Departments has been approved by the Board of Agriculture and is being considered shortly in Executive Council. There are also proposals before the three Governments for centralizing Veterinary Research at Kabete which entail increased expenditure and increased responsibilities for the Chief Veterinary Research Officer who, as you know, it is proposed should take over the command of the Kenya Veterinary Department on Brasseys' retirement.



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

Sir,

We beg to inform you that this Society has now formed a special Committee of men and women with large African experience to advise the General Committee upon all questions affecting Africa. This Sub-Committee has under consideration the recommendations made by Sir Alan Pim in his report upon the situation in Kenya.

I am requested to ask whether this Sub-Committee might be informed what steps it is proposed to take to implement these recommendations which apply to the natives of Kenya Colony. The points which the Committee has particularly in mind are the following:-

- (1) That the Chief Native Commissioner should be given some more authoritative position than he appears at present to occupy.
- (2) That increased powers should be conferred upon the Provincial Commissioners.
- (3) The variation in the system of native taxation and in the methods of its administration.
- (4) The Committee was impressed with the criticism of Sir Alan Pim upon the question of training natives in medical service, and would like to know what steps are being taken to create a subordinate native medical service.
- (5) The Committee agrees strongly with Sir Alan Pim that some steps should be taken to develop native co-operative organisations for the production and marketing of exportable commodities.

- (6) The Committee would greatly appreciate some information, if only in general terms, as to what steps will be taken to provide for a fuller training and equipment of the natives to take their part in improving the economic position of the Colony.
